

Bloody Riots Grip Chile Following Bus Fare Hike

SANTIAGO, Chile, Aug. 18 (AP)—Emergency powers asked by the government to cope with bloody rioting that has gripped Santiago for 48 hours went into effect with congressional approval today.

The chamber of deputies approved the request 95 to 10 after an all night session.

Disagreement over a half cent boost in bus fares caused the rioting, which has cost seven lives. The government charges communist agitators have fanned the unrest.

The new law empowers the government to move citizens from one part of the country to the other; to arrest suspects in their homes without court order, and to suspend or restrict the right of public assembly and the liberty of press and radio. It is effective for six months and may be extended.

Hospitals said the seven dead included two students, a cadet, and a streetcar motorman.

At least 21 other persons were wounded, four seriously. Three suffered gunshot wounds. The others were hurt by bricks and flying glass from smashed windows.

Meanwhile the University Students federation defied government orders to return to class tomorrow and proclaimed a student's strike.

The fare increase which has precipitated all the furor was from 1.40 pesos to 1.60 pesos (.12 cents to 2.6 cents).

The cabinet declared the bus fare was boosted only after a careful survey showed it was needed.

Few buses were operating in Santiago following the smashing of their windows. Some empty bus depots were set afire. Thousands of persons were unable to get to work. Merchants have closed their shops and shuttered their windows.

US Agencies Get Another Cash Handout

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 (AP)—Numerous big government agencies got their third temporary cash handout of the year today.

President Truman signed a stop-gap measure putting them back on a cash basis for another month.

But nearly \$30,000,000 in operating funds that should have been voted six weeks ago still were snarled up in congress. September 15 is the new deadline for solving the tangle — the third new deadline congress has set since June 30.

Quick teamwork between chairman Cannon (D-Mo.) and McKeellar (D-Tenn.) of the house and senate appropriations committees ended a temporary financial emergency late yesterday for a long list of government agencies which have been waiting for passage of their regular appropriations since the new fiscal year started July 1.

Wreckage Of Plane May Be Missing B-26

PORTLAND, Aug. 18 (AP)—Wreckage of an airplane was found on Mount Hood today and first speculation was that it might be that of an air force B-26 missing since April 21.

Two men making their way up the mountainside reported by walkie-talkie radio, seeing a gun turret, according to Earl Swanson, assistant manager of Timberline lodge.

Swanson said the men estimated, from the plane's emergence from deep winter storms, that it had been there about four months.

The missing B-26 was lost on a flight from Hamilton field, Calif., to Portland last April 21. Aboard were Air Force Col. Archibald Y. Smith, 49, San Francisco, pilot; Army Col. Walter W. Hodge, 45, San Francisco, and M. Sgt. H. E. Slugs, San Jose, Calif.

The wreckage, scattered over a wide area on the mountain's southwest slope at about the 7000 or 8000 foot level, was found by Charles Collett Jr., Timberline lodge employee, while on a hiking trip Tuesday. He returned to the lodge Wednesday morning, reported the find, and early today he and Forest Ranger Jim Ralph started up the mountain.

Collett reported that the plane apparently crashed head-on into Missippi Head, a massive rock formation.

Siskiyou Supervisors Veto Pay Up

YREKA, Calif., Aug. 18 — The Siskiyou county board of supervisors tentatively adopted a budget calling for \$4,570,000, about the same as last year, at a heated hearing Wednesday, but raises for a group of county employees were ruled out.

A definite budget total will come up at a hearing Friday, which was called to straighten out minor budget details resulting from the salary raise dispute.

Chairman Gordon Jacobs said the tax rate will be less than \$2.47, which in itself is a reduction of 18 cents from last year, because of yesterday's budgetary slashes.

Highlights of Friday's session were clashes between Supervisor W. A. Barr of Mount Shasta and farming groups which were represented.

The vote to turn down a raise for a group of county employees resulted from a resolution presented to the board by the Scott valley and Horticbrook granges and the Siskiyou county farm bureau.

The resolution read: "We, the taxpayers in a meeting called this 17th day of August, 1949, resolve that we are wholly opposed to anything that will in any way raise or increase our taxes in the coming year. We oppose any salary increases. We oppose any expenditure for airports. We oppose the creation of an office of airport coordinator."

Previously, the board had considered a flat \$20 per month increase for 19 county employees who have not had a salary raise in the last year.

Barr, at one time in the meeting, even moved to abolish the farm advisor's office, to see, he said, just how much the farmers would do to save money on items which might affect them while discriminating against a small group of local county employees who receive less than the going wage outside of county government.

Supervisor Fred Burton of Yreka made a motion that "all wage increases not already granted be denied," which the board adopted. Barr voted against the motion.

While the group of 19 will receive no pay boost, the board did approve raises for county employees in six exceptional cases without opposition. They include the assistant district attorney, raised from \$2320 to \$3000; three deputy sheriffs, from \$2335 to \$275, and two welfare department typists, from \$150 to \$165.

The board must set a definite tax rate by September.
