At Fairview will be Marguerite Parker, Kerby, B. A. Washburn university; Thelma Pinkerton, Eugene, University of Oregon; Eliza-

beth Rooper, Pendleton, B. A. Oregon College of Education; and William Hamilton, B. A. Eastern Oregon college.

Conger will have two new teachers, Anna Hansen, Salem, B. S. Oregon College of Education, and Edna Young, Klamath Falls, Maryville, S. C.

Fremont and Roosevelt will each have one new teacher. Mary Lou Monroe, B. A. Washington State, will teach at Roosevelt, and Harriet Mueller, Spokane, B. M. Northwest, will be added to the staff at Fremont. Supervisor of elementary libraries will be Helen Tyler, Baton Rouge, La., A. B. Hunter, N. Y.

Alma Davis, Grants Pass, B. S. Oregon State, and Ruth Shipley, Baker, B. S. University of Oregon, will teach girls' physical education at Klamath Union high school. Carl Harry Gustafson, B. S. Oregon State, will help direct the boys' physical education classes.

The boy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Sari of 2439 Homedale road.

There were no charges filed in the case, but warnings were issued.

# Truman Inks Indian School Money Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Klamath county gets a government loan of \$150,000 to improve four schools under a bill signed today by President Truman.

The improvements will be made at the Chiloquin and Sprague River schools on the Klamath Indian reservation and at Bonanza and Bly, just outside the reservation. A fourth of the students in the schools are Indians.

Heating, lighting and sewer systems will be improved at all four schools. Shop work will be started at Bonanza and Bly to try to keep Indian students in high school. Chiloquin will get a gymnasium and Sprague River a cafeteria.

The federal government will put up about half the cost of the improvements and get \$150,000 back at 3 per cent interest over 30 years. This will be done by withholding annual federal payments for education of Indians in the county.

**OLD SURVEY PARTY**—This 1910 picture shows a survey party working on the Southern Pacific railroad extension in the vicinity of Chiloquin. The S. P. had reached Klamath Falls from the south the previous year, and was preparing for northward construction. The picture belongs to Ed Cross, 531 Prescott street, who was driving the team and can be seen on the driver's seat. The instrument man in the foreground is Ed Brock, and others of the party are Shorty Parker, Frank Sargent and a man named Gill. The S. P., incidentally, extended its line north of Chiloquin to Kirk, but it wasn't until the middle 'twenties that finished the link to Eugene that made the "Natron cutoff" the main line and put Klamath Falls really on the railroad map.

# Dependents Of Vets Who Died Within 3 Years Of Discharge Get Benefits

Widows, children and dependent parents of World War II veterans who died within three years after honorable discharge were reminded this week by the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs that they may be eligible for social security benefits earned as the result of the man's time in active service.

Title II of the social security act provides that such veterans are deemed to have died fully insured, to have received monthly wages of not less than \$180, and to have been paid not less than \$200 in wages in each year in which they had 30 days or more of active service after September 16, 1940, under the act.

The veteran must have had 90 days of continuous service, a part of which must have been between September 16, 1940, and July 25, 1947, unless he was discharged sooner for service incurred disabilities.

The effect of title II, approved in August, 1946, is to assure monthly

income payments to a widow with minor children, or to the dependent parents, or a lump sum payment to the unmarried widow without minor children, surviving a World War II veteran discharged without dishonor who died within three years after his discharge.

Payments are not made, however, where survivors are receiving death compensation from the Veterans Administration because of service connected death.

Oregon officials of the social security administration said that while the bulk of payments under the act have been completed, due to the fact that most World War II

servicemen were discharged more than three years ago, there are still some deaths occurring among servicemen discharged later. Also, they said, it is possible some survivors have not filed because they were unaware of these benefits. Such applications are still valid, they said, although payments will be made retroactive only three months from time of application.

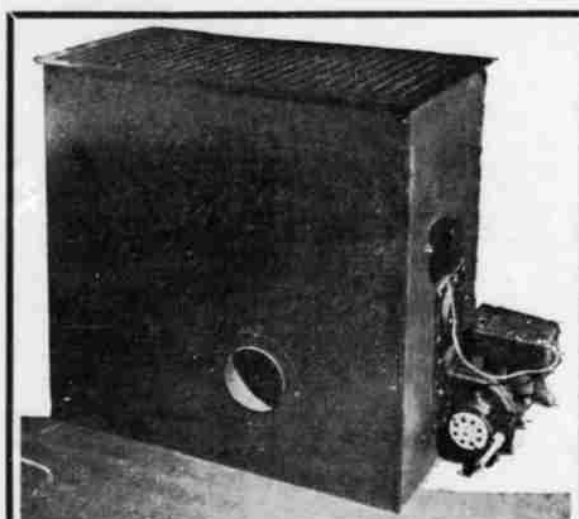
Applicants were advised to contact their nearest social security office, county veterans' service office, or the Portland or Salem offices of the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

# US Generals Invited To State Fair

SALEM, Aug. 20 (AP)—Eight generals and admirals of the five branches of the armed services, including Gen. Mark W. Clark, have been invited by Gov. Douglas McKay to be his guests at the Oregon State fair on Governor's Day, September 8, it was announced at the governor's offices here Friday.

The invitations have gone to General Clark; Maj. Gen. Claude A. Larkin, USMC, Ret., and Vice Adm. Thomas L. Gatch, USN, Ret., both of Portland; Maj. Gen. K. E. Rockey, USMC, San Francisco, commanding general, department of the Pacific; Brig. Gen. Robert A. McClure, USA, Vancouver barracks, commander of the North Pacific district; Rear Adm. H. H. Good, USN, Seattle, commanding 13th naval district; Rear Adm. Raymond T. McElligott, USCO, Seattle, commandant 13th coast guard district, and Maj. Gen. John E. Upston, USA, Hamilton City, Calif., commanding general fourth air force.

Presidio spokesman for General Clark have indicated that the sixth army commander, highest ranking active officer on the Pacific coast, plans to attend.
