LET'S put it this way: Suppose these three perfume big shots who got to Paris by official favor turned in and sewed up the perfume business in such a way as to beat their competitors to the gun when it became possible to ship French perfumes to America again.

That would have been quite a deal. The eventual profits from it would have made a few home freeters distributed judiciously around Washington a piker transaction. Yet, on its face, the whole affair would have seemed strictly on the up-and-up. All they would have got was a plane ride to Paris, for which they paid full fare.

BUT GETTING TO PARIS WHEN NO COMPETITOR COULD GET THERE COULD HAVE BEEN IMMENSELY PROFITABLE.

WHEN government holds in its hands SO MUCH POWER over business that a simple little matter like the granting of permission to three men to ride to Paris on a government plane on which they paid in cash the full fair could involve heavy profits on a deal in which slickers WITH government help could put it all over competitors WITHOUT government help.

Well, when things like that can happen corruption in government is always possible. That is why it is a good thing for congress to investigate and bring out into the open all the details of every transaction that might be off color.

Chet Irving, manager of the Pine Industrial Relations council, management-labor organization serving 116 firms in the pine industry of Oregon and California, addressed the Klamath Falls Rotary club Friday noon on the topic, "Labor Legislation."

Irving prefaced his discussion with the statement that, in his estimation, everyone should be vitally interested in all state and federal legislation or labor-management relations as these laws directly affect the local and national economy and the individual financial welfare of almost every citizen.

"So long as our congressional delegates handle this vital matter on a non-partisan basis, voting their own conscience as to the best interests of our nation after all testimony is fairly heard," he said, "I believe the proper solutions to the many problems which were reached." His general discussion detailed the history of labor-management legislation over the past 15 years and cited his personal experiences in presenting testimony recently before a congressional committee studying proposed labor law changes.

Hugh Campbell served as Rotary's chairman of the day. The program was slated under Rotary's vocational service objectives.

Morse Said To Be "Hard To Beat" PORTLAND, Aug. 20 (AP)—It will take an outstanding candidate to defeat Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.), a democratic party spokesman admitted here today.

Jack Redding, director of publicity for the democratic national committee, here to survey the Oregon political situation, described Morse as the democrats' most "formidable" opponent in the Northwest.

The chance of unseating Morse depends "entirely on the candidate... you can't beat somebody with nobody," he said.

He added, however, that democrats have a good chance of winning two of the four representatives' seats in Oregon.

44 Injured In Train Collision CANAAN, N. H., Aug. 20 (AP)—Two diesel-powered Boston and Maine railroad passenger trains crashed head-on at a siding here yesterday injuring 44 persons—none seriously.

Officials at the Mary Hitchcock hospital in Hanover said the injured—mostly from New England and Canada—suffered bruises and some fractures.

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McKay To Be Spud Parade Judge

MERRILL, Aug. 20 — Gov. Douglas McKay has accepted an invitation to act as one of the judges for the thirteenth annual Potato Festival parade, in a letter received yesterday by Bob Barry, parade chairman.

J. H. VanWinkle, publisher of the Banner Courier in Oregon City, and Con Fitzgerald Jr., prominent businessman of Lakeview, have accepted similar invitations.

Festival dates have been set for October 21 and 22, with the big parade, a festival highlight, planned for 10 a. m. Saturday, October 22.

ITU Stays Out Of NLRB File, No Signature

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 20 (AP)—The International Typographical union closed out its 31st annual convention today, resolutely committed for another year to stay outside national labor board jurisdiction.

The printers again refused to order its officers to sign the non-communist affidavits required to place the union under NLRB procedure.

The union also: 1. Rejected a resolution by members of the San Francisco local which has been under fire for signing a memorandum agreement short of ITU contract standards.

The motion would have instructed ITU officers to stop using union publications for "unwarranted articles" against intra-union opponents.

2. Submitted a union referendum on an increase in the salaries of the president and secretary-treasurer from \$10,000 to \$12,000 a year; vice president from \$7,500 to \$9,500.

3. Rejected a one-union proposal for the whole printing industry.

4. Directed more cooperation with allied printing crafts.

5. Refused to solicit other unions for strike funds.

6. Voted to intensify ITU activity in Canada.

President Woodruff Randolph told the convention he opposed the move to force officers to sign non-communist affidavits because it would place the union under NLRB regulation.

"We don't want to use these procedures. We have not from the beginning and we do not now," he said.

Seven Federal Agencies Streamlined, Winds Up US Government Plans Till '50

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Seven federal agencies were shifted or streamlined today. That just about completes government reorganization for this year.

No more major changes are likely until 1950. Congress and President Truman, by means of five laws and six reorganization plans, have gone part of the way in carrying out the recommendations of the commission headed by former President Herbert Hoover.

Robert L. McCormick, director of the Washington office of the citizens committee for reorganization—an outfit created to work for the Hoover commission's proposals—told a reporter:

"The accomplishments up to now have far exceeded our expectations, but some of the most important legislation is still before us and the road is long."

Here is the score for 1949: Six reorganization plans took effect today (technically at midnight last night). The U. S. employment service and certain other functions moved into the labor department.

The bureau of public roads moved into the commerce department. The No. 1 officials in the post office department, civil service commission, and maritime commission got more administrative authority. The national security resources board and national security council became parts of the executive office of the president.

Another law enacted June 2 had already created the post of under-secretary of defense.

The general services administration was created by congress on July 1, placing the maintenance, purchasing, and property disposal agencies of the government under one roof.

A law enacted May 26 gave the secretary of state authority to reorganize the state department.

Certain other proposals were made by the president—including the creation of a department of welfare and the removal of postmaster appointments from politics—but congress has either killed them or made little progress toward enacting them at this session.

CRACKDOWN PORTLAND, Aug. 20 (AP)—The city made its first crackdown in the anti-punchboard campaign here yesterday.

Mrs. Bessie Pugh, 47, a tavern operator, was fined \$50 in municipal court on conviction of displaying punchboards other than the few question-and-answer kinds that are legal.

Hot Ashes Cause Of Home Blaze Suburban department firemen were called to 3228 Bristol Friday afternoon where an outbuilding near the Albert Murray residence was afire.

Firemen reported that the blaze started from a box of hot ashes in the structure. Slight damage was confined to the building but did not extend to the Murray garage and home.
