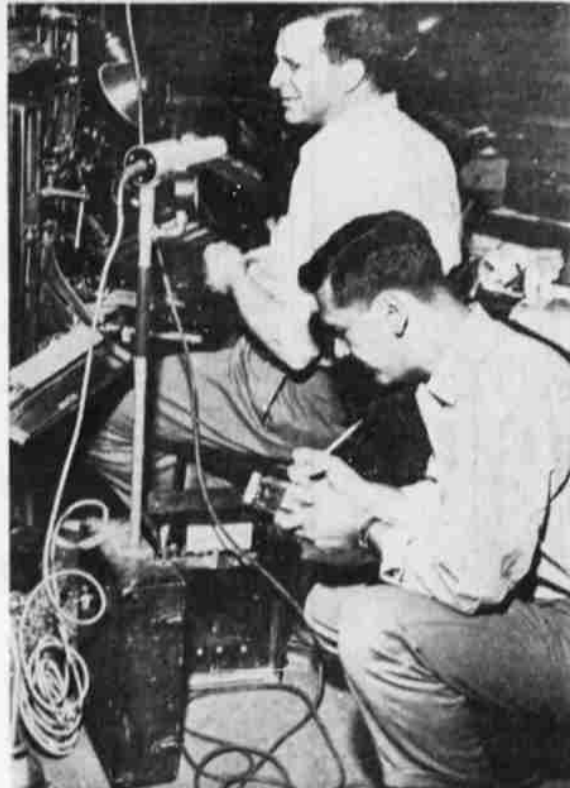
Cancelled—The C. E. Retreat, scheduled for August 21, has been cancelled.

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County School Registration September 1

All high school and elementary school students of the Klamath county school district will register on September 1, according to an announcement today from the county school office.

Teachers report for work on August 29. A two-day session of general meetings of all teachers of the district is scheduled for August 30-31 at the Altamont Junior high school building. Friday, September 2, will be devoted to in-service work in the local school under the supervision of the principal. No school will be held on Labor Day. Classes will begin on September 6 in all Klamath county schools.

There has been no change in districting for enrollment for either elementary or high school students in the suburban areas. Parents are urged to have all students register on September 1 in order that arrangements can be made for proper housing of all students.

Upper class students in the Keno area will have the choice of attending either Klamath Union high school or the Henley high school for the coming year. The ninth grade students from Keno will attend Henley high school.

The county school district will continue to pay tuition and provide transportation for those students who have already reached sophomore standing at KUHS. The Henley high school bus will leave Keno at 8:20. The bus for
