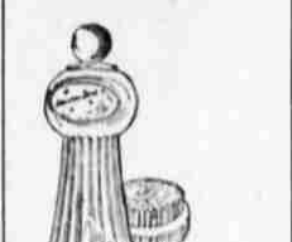
Members are asked to bring their own flowers and containers for the demonstration.
