WESTERN OREGON—Considerable cloudiness with occasional light rain showers today and tonight. Thursday partly cloudy. Little change in temperature with highs both days 70 to 80 in interior and 60 to 70 on coast. Lows tonight 50 to 60. Light variable winds, mostly southwesterly to westerly, off coast today, becoming westerly to northwesterly and 10 to 20 miles an hour tonight and Thursday.

EASTERN OREGON—Partly cloudy with little change in temperature today and tonight. Fair and warmer Thursday. Highs today 70 to 80 and 75 to 80 Thursday. Low tonight 45 to 55.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA—Fair today and Thursday except for fog or low cloudiness near coast. Slightly warmer in interior today. Westerly to northwesterly winds of 10 to 15 miles an hour off coast.

ROCKY RIVER VALLEY—Fair today and Thursday. High both days 85. Low tonight 52.
