

Klamath Kids Ready Pets For Parade Tomorrow; Prizes For Each Entry

The parade will begin at 11 a. m. at the court house, and will move down Main street, terminating at the new YMCA grounds at Eleventh and Pine streets.

Records Fall At Round-Up In Pendleton

PENDLETON, Aug. 25 (P)—A bulldogging record and a near-record call roping time were already posted for the 39th annual Pendleton roundup today as cowpokes went into second day competition.

Oral Zumwalt, Wolf Creek, Mont., dropped a steer in 8.4 seconds yesterday for the new record. The time was four-tenths of a second better than the previous mark set in 1946.

The fast call roping time of 13.1 seconds by Cotton Lee, Clovis, N. M., was within one-fifth of a second of the record set in 1941.

Gene Rambo, Shandon, Calif., a leader for his third International Rodeo association title, had troubles in the first day's events. He was thrown in the bareback ride, failed to halt his steer in the bulldogging and pulled leather in the saddle bronc ride. He placed, however, in steer roping. Rambo won the Jackson trophy here in 1944 and his early misses in the points put him behind for a repeat in this arena.

Frank Gamble, Toppenish, Wash., used his own string of ponies to win the pony express, cowboy pony and relay races.

A first day crowd of 6500 cheered the veteran rodeo entrants.

Prune Monopoly Case Dismissed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (P)—A complaint charging the Northwest Dried Fruit association, Portland, and its members with conspiring to create a monopoly in the sale of prunes has been dismissed by the federal trade commission.

Commissioner William A. Ayres, in an opinion in which the full commission concurred, said the complaint had involved a contract clause designed to protect sellers against delivery obligations. This hinged on whether the crop was unusually damaged because of weather conditions.

Ayres' ruling noted the association comprised virtually all the prune industry in Washington, Oregon and Idaho. The members produce what amounts to the nation's entire output of Italian-type prunes.

Fruit Moths Again Found In Oregon

SALEM, Aug. 25 (P)—First oriental fruit moths found in Oregon since 1945 and the first ever found in a peach-growing area here were taken this month from a backyard peach tree in the city limits of The Dalles, Frank McKennon, chief of the division of plant industry, state department of agriculture, said today.

The moths (not flies, for the oriental fruit fly has not been found in the state of Oregon, according to McKennon) were discovered at Nysa and Ontario in 1945, and although that area has been "trapped" every year since 1945 no further specimens have been picked up there.

Agriculture department survey workers will do more "trapping" in The Dalles area to determine extent of the infestation and steps will be taken immediately to set up a control program, McKennon said.

NEW SUPERINTENDENT

ASTORIA, Aug. 25 (P)—Kenneth E. Wolf, 31, Minneapolis, will become superintendent of the Columbia hospital here September 1. He succeeds Carl O. Moberg, who is resigning after 18 years in the post.

Foresighted Marine Flier Late And Wet!

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 25 (P)—Dan Clark, marine reserve flier, Denver, was flying over the ocean near Catalina island when he ran into his base:

"Call my wife. Tell her I'll be late for chow."

Minutes later the engine of his Corsair plane conked out and he crashed into the ocean as he had anticipated. A fishing boat picked him up wet but unhurt.

Reclamation Funds Voted For Klamath

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (P)—Cash appropriations for a half dozen Northward reclamation projects were voted by the senate yesterday. Most figures represented increases over amounts previously voted by the house.

They included (with house-approved figures in parentheses):

- Lewis Crechards, Idaho, \$270,000 (\$229,500);
- Palladas, Idaho \$205,000 (\$174,250);
- Deschutes, Ore., \$1,464,700 (\$1,162,800);
- Klamath, Ore.-Calif., \$803,460 (\$850,000);
- Yakima, Rosa division, Wash., \$413,205 (\$382,462);
- Hungru Horse, Mont., \$28,786,250 (\$20,400,000);
- Columbia Basin, Wash., \$70,034,390 (\$59,075,000).

Did Hoover Refuse Senate Seat?

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (P)—Herbert Hoover and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey both declined comment on whether the governor offered the ex-president a seat in the senate.

The report that the seat now held by Sen. John Foster Dulles (R-N.Y.) was first offered to Hoover appeared in a Washington Evening Star newspaper column yesterday.

"Mr. Hoover, while recognizing the courtesy of the New York governor, declined," the columnist wrote.

REFUSED LICENSE

SALEM, Aug. 25 (P)—The nursery license renewal application of L. E. Marcus, operator of Sherwood bulb gardens, has been refused formally by the state department of agriculture. The state held Marcus guilty on four complaints. They included charges that he deceived his customers and misrepresented his merchandise.

Stepfather 'Guesses' He Mistreated Vet Amputee

MONTESANO, Wash., Aug. 25 (P)—"I guess on several occasions I dragged him by the hair and slapped his face, but I was just trying to cure him."

With those words, Sheriff Mike Kilgore said, 52-year-old Frank Chase confessed orally to mauling his 29-year-old amputee veteran stepson, Henry Chum.

The confession was given yesterday before a group of newspapermen.

Kilgore said Chase admitted beating Chum because the latter "had lost his self respect."

A suit is held in the Grays Harbor county jail on assault charges. A suit in Chum's behalf was filed in Superior Judge J. M. Phillips court by Lester Strimatter, a Hoquiam attorney. The complaint charged that Chase, by "intimidation, threats, force and fraud," took \$2768.05 in government disability payments from Chum, and alleged that the World War II veteran was forced to sign a certificate of title for the amputee automobile given him by the government and that Chase sold the machine.

The slightly built ex-GI, who lost his left leg above the knee in a Japanese bombing on New Guinea, told Kilgore yesterday he had been forced to crawl about the house on hands and knees for 15 hours last Christmas Day.

Judge Denies Communists' Mistrial Plea

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (P)—Federal Judge Harold R. Medina today denied a motion by defense counsel for a mistrial in the communist conspiracy trial.

Judge Medina also denied the motion that Russel Janney, a juror be disqualified and that an inquiry be made as to his possible "influence" on other jurors.

Defense attorneys yesterday asked for a mistrial on the ground that Janney—author of the best-selling novel "Miracle of the Bells"—had shown bias in private conversations with an actress and singer, Miss Carol B. Nathanson.

The 11 communist leaders are charged with conspiracy to advocate violent overthrow of the government.
