

City Airport Financial Outlook Brighter; Fate Hinges On UAL's Service

After a couple of shaky years, the financial picture at the Klamath municipal airport is looking up, but its eventual fate hinges on whether United Air Lines will continue operation here, W. B. Whitcomb, airport manager, indicated today.

"We stand to lose \$3400 a year if United is pulled out of Klamath Falls," Whitcomb said. The fiscal year of 1948-1949 showed an operating loss of only \$83.83, due in large to the fact that a capital outlay of \$10,596.64 was spent for the installation of a new water system at the airport.

The \$10,000 plus figure represents the city's share of 44 per cent of the total cost of the water system. The government stands 56 per cent of the total cost.

For the first month of the current fiscal year, July, receipts at the airport show a \$3398.61 total with expenditures running \$1749.40. The city budget included \$6722 for the airport this year, marking the first time since 1941 that the airport has needed operating money.

Improvements at the airport this year include cleaning the surplus buildings, planting a half-acre of lawn near the administration building; adding of one acre of parking facilities, complete with sidewalks; and painting the restaurant, fire station and parachute lift.

Winter preparations have also been completed. Runways have been patched, ditches have been cleaned for handling of the surplus water.

The Lions club donated the sprinkler heads for the half-acre of lawn, the labor was furnished by the Klamath Air Search and Rescue unit and the city chipped in with seed, fertilizer and pipe.

As a mirror to the optimistic financial outlook at the airport, rental on buildings has been lowered, Whitcomb said.

headquarters in Pendleton. In 1922, he went into the financial end of the business as liquidating agent for the Portland Cattle Loan company. In 1926, he began a seven-year stay as superintendent of the Baldwin sheep company (Hay Creek ranch), a d.r.a.s. known throughout the Northwest for its high quality Rambouillet sheep and Hereford cattle. He became agricultural field man for the Regional Agricultural Credit corporation in 1932.

He joined the staff of The First National bank in 1936 as agricultural field man with headquarters at Pendleton, servicing the Pendleton, Heppner, Condon, Fossil, Bend and The Dalles branches.

He subsequently was transferred to Lakeview where he serviced Klamath Falls branches.

In 1946, he transferred to the Klamath Falls branch where in June 1948 he was made an officer in charge of livestock and agricultural loans, the position he now holds.

Snider's banking career dates back prior to 1920. He was cashier of the Paisley National bank in Lakeview from 1920 to 1931, and remained in the same position with that bank's successor, The Commercial National bank, until 1935. When that bank became a member of The First National group in 1935, he was made manager.
