

Prize Spuds Sought For Big Barbecue

New "laters" scratched out of the ground by Walt Jendrzewski, "Big Push" of the fourteenth annual Rotary 4-H and FFA junior livestock show, will be served at the barbecue the evening of August 30. Jendrzewski said today that he will make a survey of fields this week to find the "biggest and best" spuds in the basin. He figures it will take eight sacks for the anticipated 1200 guests.

Pattern of the barbecue, which will immediately precede the livestock sale, will follow that of other years. Serving will be in the grandstand at the fairgrounds.

All exhibitors will be served first, starting at 4:30, to be ready in time for the parade before the guests during the dinner hour.

Serving adult guests will begin at 5 o'clock. They will enter through both entrances of the grandstand and turn inward to the first aisle and will receive "grab" at the lower edge of the grandstand from the South 40 and North 40 gangs with Charlie Martin and G. C. Lorenz in charge.

Prime herebards, donated by Geary brothers, will be barbecued in a pit at the fairgrounds.

Placing of exhibitor entries, awards, including special awards and donors, and introductions of exhibitors and club leaders and notables connected with the show will be made over the public address system by Bud Chandler of KFLW, Andy Lopez, Wally Larkin, Mark Smith, Gene Ballie, Doc Ricker and Gene Gross.

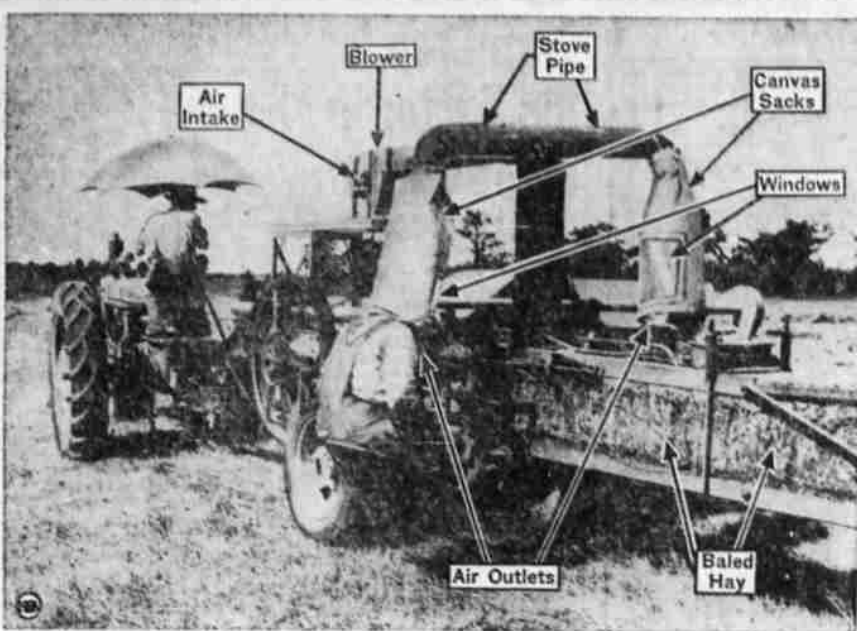

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Frozen Wheat Has Plenty Proteins

LA GRANDE, Aug. 25 (AP)—The assistant county agent said Wednesday that laboratory tests showed frozen-wheat value tested as high as food value as regular U. S. No. 1 wheat.

Burns Bailey so notified farmers, saying that buyers may "try to take advantage of farmers, as there is no organized market channel for sale of frozen wheat."

While freezing naturally means less wheat per acre, the shriveled wheat contains, pound for pound, more protein than standard grades, and only 4 per cent less carbohydrate, Bailey said.

Scholarship In 4-H Work To Be Given

Special recognition of older Oregon 4-H club boys and girls in the form of annual college scholarships sponsored by the Standard Oil company of California have been announced by State 4-H Club Leader J. J. Allen. Selection of the first scholarship winners will be made in October this year.

Word from E. V. Burns, Portland, district manager, indicates Standard of California will sponsor four college scholarships totaling \$1000 each year. Two scholarships amounting to \$300 each will be awarded to the boy and girl winners. Additional scholarships of \$200 each will be presented to the second place boy and girl.

In addition to the scholarship, the winning boy or girl deemed most worthy will be given an all-expense trip to national 4-H club congress in Chicago, Allen states.

Applicants for the scholarships must be at least juniors in high school and rank scholastically in

the upper one-third of their class. Basis for the awards will be made on 4-H achievement, leadership, community service and the judging of a 50 word story that the club member must write on "How 4-H Club Work Has Contributed to My Development."

Allen states that he has been discussing with Standard Oil company officials for several months the part that company might play in cooperating with the Oregon 4-H club program. This recognition to older 4-H club boys and girls will provide a stimulus for what is considered one of the fundamentals of the youth program—leadership development he says.

Applicants who are interested in applying for the awards are advised to consult their local county extension agents.
