

### Ducked Cafe Tab, Charge; Two Jailed

Donald G. Tenny, 25, and Ray Morris, 32, were jailed early this morning as the result of a ruckus growing out of a \$1.58 meal tab at the K cafe.

The men, according to a cafe waitress, departed from the cafe without paying their check. They were arrested a few minutes later on Main street and while being escorted to the city jail Tenny reportedly tried to beat up the arresting officer.

In municipal court Morris pleaded not guilty to a disorderly conduct charge but guilty to being drunk while Tenny pleaded guilty to being drunk and disorderly and not guilty to a second disorderly conduct count.

Judgment was reserved by Police Judge Leigh Ackerman until this afternoon.

### Salem, New Farm Bureau Office Site

Frank W. Brown of Langell valley, president of the Klamath county farm bureau, has announced that the Oregon Farm Bureau federation will move its state offices from Pendleton and Milton to Salem, effective August 30.

Federation offices have been located in Pendleton and Milton for the past 15 years.

The move developed from action by western and central Oregon counties and was supplemented by action of the bureau in eastern Oregon at a recent housing delegation meeting in Hood River.

The more centralized location will enable the organization to give better service particularly in counties west of the Cascades, and it will also put the federation in a better position to work with agricultural groups and college and government agencies in Corvallis, Salem and Portland.

President W. Lowell Steen and Executive Vice President Marshall Swearingen have moved to Salem where both have purchased homes, and most of the federation's state personnel, about seven families, is also moving to the Salem area.

### THE DOCTOR SAYS

#### Magic Cure For Rare Ill

You probably never heard of myasthenia gravis. It's a very rare condition whose cause is still unknown but its treatment, if not cure, has been enormously improved. There is a real medical miracle story in connection with the treatment.  
It begins with a rather typical description of the malady given by an anonymous patient recently in the British Lancet. Her cure was the "miracle" mentioned above. The patient was 18 years old in 1925. She first noticed seeing double and felt fatigued. After several months of this, while she was ironing a dress she suddenly found that she could not hold up her head which kept dropping forward. Soon thereafter her knees started giving way underneath her at odd times.  
Just Another Try!  
In February 1935, 10 years after the first symptoms began, the patient's fiancé, who was a medical student, told her that he had something new for her to try. Her first thought, she said, was "Oh bother! Another injection and another false hope."  
"I submitted to the injection," she said, "and within a few minutes began to feel very strange. When I lifted my arms, exerting the effort to which I had become accustomed, they shot into the air. Every movement I attempted was grotesquely magnified until I had learned to make less exertion. I had simply regained relatively normal strength—it was strange, wonderful, and at first very frightening." The drug was neostigmine which the patient continued to take almost every day for the next 14 years.  
In the summer of 1937 the patient married her medical benefactor. It was a happy ending to our story.
