

### Russ Family To Operate Newberg Farm

NEWBERG, Aug. 23 (P)—A Russian family from a displaced persons camp is expected here to become operator of a farm for W. G. Putnam.

Putnam, who arranged for Mr. and Mrs. Josef Svichar and their three children to come here from Europe, said they would help him on his Newberg farm, then would be installed as managers when they get acquainted. Putnam then will go to the coast to start a dairy farm.

He said he applied to the displaced persons commission a year ago for a self-supporting farm family. "They'll be A-1 after clearance through the government machinery," he said.

He said he asked for a displaced family because he thought it was a good idea.

Putnam said the Svichars are listed as dairy farmers. Their children are Vadimar, 21, an auto mechanic; Antenna, 16, and Simaida, 11.

### Shaw Settles Crome Problem

LONDON, Aug. 23 (P)—George Bernard Shaw proposed a sweeping cure for crime Wednesday: abolish prisons and put their inmates to death.

The 83-year-old playwright set forth his views in a printed postcard mailed to editors from his home at Ayot Saint Lawrence.

"If we find a hungry tiger at large or a cobra in the garden, we do not punish it," Shaw said. "We kill it because, if we do not, it will kill us."

"Plea, lice, locusts, white ants, anopheles mosquitoes, Australian rabbits, must be exterminated, not punished.

"Precisely the same necessity arises in the case of intractably dangerous or mischievous human beings, sane or insane, hopeless idiots, and enemy soldiers.

"The kindest method so far known is to let criminals go to bed and to sleep as usual, and then turn on an odorless gas to prevent them ever waking. Enemy soldiers we have to kill how we can."

### UC Scientists To Face Red Board

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (P)—Two University of California scientists have been subpoenaed by the house un-American activities committee to testify next month at hearings on wartime communist activity at Berkeley.

Committee Counsel Frank P. Taverner said the scientists are Ken Max Manfred and Irving David Fox. Taverner declined to say what specific information the committee seeks from them.

He said they have been called to appear in Washington on September 14, although the date may be changed later.

The radiation laboratory at Berkeley was a center of atomic research during the war. The committee has taken testimony that a communist cell was established there and had some contact with Soviet espionage agents.

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### Building Pushed As State Fair Date Nears; Work OK

Although Labor day is still a week or so away, Manager Leo Spitzbart of the Oregon State Fair has pronounced the exposition ready for its 24th annual renewal beginning September 8.

Hurried construction schedules have made it possible to avoid much of the usual last minute confusion. A small amount of work remains to be done on one of the new entrances to the grounds from the north. Workmen are cleaning up the last bit of painting on the new "Kiddieland", juvenile amusement area, that should be extremely popular for youngsters and tired parents.

Advance mail ticket sales to all fair attractions are reported to be the heaviest in fair history, according to Joe Simersal, ticket manager. Mail requests have been received from all sections of the state.

Some difficulty has arisen in the allocation of stall and pen space to the record number of livestock entries in the various open classes. However, Ben Newell, Slem, superintendent of the livestock show, has stated that all show strings will be accommodated when judging starts Labor Day morning.

Entries in the combined textile and culinary show are about average but departmental heads expect the lists to swell before the entry deadline of September 4. Mrs. Verle Goode, Stayton, floral superintendent, says all available display space is gone with more garden clubs than ever before planning to exhibit.

Commercial space on the grounds, and in the fair's main agricultural building has been sold out for several weeks. Many new appliance and farm dealers will display for the first time.

The younger gentry is slated for a big thrill with a glimpse at the new toy railroad route and station. The route has been made more life-like, a new tunnel and station erected, and the tracks completely rearranged.

Admission prices at the outside gate are the same as before the war, fifty cents including tax. Children 12 and under will be admitted free. There will be four free mid-way shows each day on the grounds featuring top circus and stage talent.

### Crop Board Says Plenty Of Cranberries

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (P)—Plenty of cranberries, to go with a near-record turkey crop, were predicted yesterday by the department of agriculture.

Its crop reporting board said the cranberry harvest will total 833,000 barrels, 21 per cent above the 685,230 barrel average for the past 10 years. Last year's record crop totaled 947,700 barrels.

Only New Jersey of the five major cranberry producing states surveyed expects less than average crop. New Jersey's prospects are for a 56,900-barrel harvest, the department said, compared with 76,800-barrel average and 69,000 last year.

Predictions for the other states include:

Washington—41,500, two per cent under 1948, 40 per cent above average; Oregon—15,500, 17 per cent above 1948, 44 per cent above average.

Soybeans planted on the contour average about two bushels more per acre than when planted up and down the slope.

### Peppy Janet Just Couldn't Go To Sleep

LEEDS, England, Aug. 23 (P)—For 27 hours, two-year-old Janet Wheelwright was the liveliest kid in town. She couldn't get to sleep. Throughout the night, she sang, danced and chattered. She played with every toy in the house. She built towering castles with her books. And still the sandman stayed away.

Exhausted, her mother took her to a doctor. She skipped and hopped the two miles distance. A sedative put her to sleep.

Later, it was discovered Janet had chewed on some army pep tablets belonging to her brother, Dennis, who had just returned home after service with the royal air force in the Middle East.
