

University Plant Gets "New Look"

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Aug. 24 (Special)—This fall, for the first time since the war, University of Oregon students will have room to breathe. A new look has been added to the campus, a new building look that will add to attractiveness and alleviate crowded conditions that have prevailed since war days.

Nearing final phases of construction are Carson hall (the new women's dormitory), and the modern University theater. Recently completed were the new wing on the school of music, and interior remodeling of Villard, second oldest campus building. The 424-seat theater will be an addition to Villard. Scheduled for completion before the academic year is out are the Student Union building and a major addition to the library.

Carson hall, a \$1,500,000 fireproof concrete and brick building, will house 333 co-eds. In addition to suites for small-group living, and a spacious dining hall, the dormitory will have small bean parlors, reception rooms, and music rooms. A sundeck is planned on the roof. The theater will feature the finest in seating, stage, lighting, acoustic and personal comfort facilities. Six major productions will be presented yearly.

Remodeling Villard hall has drawn the radio, speech and drama divisions to be consolidated under one roof. Although the exterior of the building remains the same, the interior was changed from a two to a three-story structure by lowering of ceilings and making use of the attic space. In addition to the three floors is a new basement, which houses dressing and sewing rooms, and necessary facilities for below-stage levels of a theater.

When the Erb Memorial Union is completed, a center for student activities will be provided on the campus for the first time. Offices of the Associated Students of the University, and student affairs will be located there. The large new ballroom can double as an auditorium or banquet room. A postoffice, barber shop, soda bar, as well as recreational rooms and an art lounge will be housed in the building.

A new service arrangement will be possible with the additional space provided by enlarging the library. Instead of having an attendant get books for students from the stacks, the students will be allowed to browse among the stacks. Under the new system, the library will be divided into a number of reader service departments, each staffed by librarians trained in special subject fields.

The enlarged three-floor area has been designed to permit unlimited horizontal expansion and to allow maximum flexibility in interior arrangement. Storage of half a million books will be possible, and almost 1800 students may be seated simultaneously when the library opens the new addition next spring.

VFW Elects Younger Men

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 26 (AP)—The Veterans of Foreign Wars prepared to wind up their golden jubilee convention today after electing younger men to controlling positions.

World War II veterans won five of seven national offices.

Clyde A. Lewis, Plattburgh, N. Y., was unanimously elected commander in chief, succeeding Lyall T. Regen, Madison, Wis. Other officers elected included: Charles C. Ball, Seattle, senior vice commander in chief.

A roll call vote was necessary to pick a 1950 convention city. Chicago won out over Atlantic City by a vote of 471 to 378 after New York and Honolulu withdrew.

Rauschnig Sees Another War Coming

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Aug. 26 (AP)—The world again is on the way to war, Hermann Rauschnig—who once warned of war with Germany—predicted yesterday.

Rauschnig, a one-time Danish official who broke with the Nazis and fled in 1935, emerged from two years of seclusion to tell an interviewer of his fears.

He once was senate president of Danish and an associate of Hitler. After fleeing, he wrote a anti-Nazi book. He came to Oregon first in 1942, announcing he would become a farmer. Then he dropped from public view.

Rauschnig said he considered the United Nations an even weaker effort toward peace than the now defunct League of Nations.

He and his family live on a small farm near Gaston.

Registration Closes Soon In Siskiyou

YREKA, Aug. 24—Siskiyou County Clerk Waldo J. Smith today reminded northern Siskiyou voters that registration rolls for the special state election November 8 close September 15.

Smith said voters need to register if they failed to vote at both the primary and general elections last year. If they voted at either, the registration remains valid.

Current registration lists show 13,397 persons eligible to vote. Smith stated city clerks, justices of the peace and other officials will handle new registrations as usual.

Sunday Brew OK In Portland

PORTLAND, Aug. 26 (AP)—The devout can't legally keep beer drinkers from their brew on Sunday.

That's what City Attorney Alexander G. Brown ruled yesterday after a group of 200 petitioned for Sunday prohibition in the city.

Brown said state law governed the sale of alcoholic drinks, and the city lacked authority to intervene.

Surgery May Cure Rare Malady

PORTLAND, Aug. 26 (AP)—A young North Bend, man who has been bleeding internally for 11 years was here today for surgery.

If successful, the operation could free James Brandt, 22, of repeated blood transfusions. He has had more than 50 in the last 10 years to replace lost blood.

His condition seems from an enlarged spleen. The surgeon said the "splenectomy" would be performed after arrival of 12 pints of blood from North Bend donors.

Tibbs, Rambo Vie For Lead At Pendleton

PENDLETON, Aug. 26 (A-O) Casey Tibbs, currently the nation's third-ranking cowboy, gets a his chance today and tomorrow to close in on Gene Rambo at the Pendleton round-up.

Rambo, twice the nation's top rodeo performer and the current pace-setter, fell from contention in the round-up yesterday, adding to earlier failures by missing his throw in the calf-roping contest.

Tibbs, who has 482 points to Rambo's 5146, meanwhile turned in an outstanding ride on "Rough Going" to add to his points.

Rambo, from Shandon, Calif., had been seeking his second title at the round-up. Tibbs is after his first.

Crowds, again large yesterday, swelled today as the annual Westward Ho parade, featuring 5000 Indians and whites in early day garb, was staged in the morning.

'Very Well Indeed,' Is Churchill

NICE, France, Aug. 26 (AP)—A spokesman for Winston Churchill said today he is recovering "very well indeed" from a cold.

The 74-year-old wartime prime minister suffered a chill two days ago after swimming in the Mediterranean. His private physician, Lord Moran, flew here from London to attend him.
