

# West Suburbs Street Naming, House Numbering Move Under Way; Area Leaders Appointed

First steps toward setting up a uniform street naming and house numbering program in suburbs to the west of Klamath Falls were taken at a mass meeting held at night.

Representatives of Stewart, Lennox, Riverside and Lindley heights areas were selected at last night's meeting, and will meet again tonight to develop the plan. Another general meeting was called for Monday night at 7:30 o'clock at the church, when final decisions will probably be made.

The matter came to a head as a result of a notice by the post office department that the suburban areas in question now are too thickly populated to continue mail service on the present basis.

R. L. Griffith, assistant postmaster, attended the meeting and explained that the post office will either institute a new rural mail delivery route in the area, or will provide mounted delivery service on the same basis as that now set up for the southeast suburbs.

The latter plan, he said, could be carried out if the streets are named and houses numbered.

If it is necessary to institute a new rural delivery service, box numbers must be changed.

It was brought out in the discussion that the house and street numbering system would be beneficial to the community not only in making possible mounted city delivery of mail, but in providing official addresses to be used by doctors in making calls, commercial delivery wagons, etc. Lack of a uniform residence address system has been annoying and inconvenient in the area, it was pointed out.

An engineer must be employed to handle the new set-up, and consideration will be given at tonight's meeting to that question.

Representatives of various areas were named as follows:

Stewart—Harvey Wyatt, Lennox—Mrs. C. W. Adams, Riverside—Glen Jones, Lindley heights—Mrs. Lewis Hornby.

Mrs. Adams is acting as temporary chairman of the group.

That is an old dodge in politics. It rests on the same principle as a mustard plaster applied to your aching back. The mustard plaster is so much more uncomfortable than your back was that you forget about your backache.

IT all comes down to this: There is literally NOTHING a politician won't do in order to stay in office. The odd part of it is that politicians are about half sincere in their thinking along that line. They come in time to think of themselves as such God-like creatures that they become convinced their country will go to pot if it is deprived of their leadership.

# Farm Lands' Re-Assessing, Merrill Topic

MERRILL, Aug. 27 — The re-assessing of farm lands for tax purposes was thoroughly discussed at Thursday's meeting of the Merrill farm bureau in the recreation hall.

Representatives of all the farm bureaus in the county are to attend a meeting at Heiler August 31, which has been called by the county assessor for the purpose of discussing this important question. Farm lands will be classified as to type and taxes assessed accordingly. All interested farmers are asked to attend.

Eber Kipatrick, president of the local bureau, and 12 other members from this district have been sent questionnaires on the subject and asked to serve on a farm board to work in conjunction with the county assessor's office.

The Merrill bureau is still discussing the irrigation situation and is of the opinion that money is not being spent in maintaining the ditches, which have not been properly kept up since 1934.

Definite action on the problem, however, will be left up to the county farm bureau, and all local bureaus are discussing the situation so that recommendations can be made to the county bureau, which meets next in Klamath Falls. The October meeting of the county bureau will be held in Merrill, and perhaps at this time some definite reports will be ready on the subjects under controversy.

# 'Wanted' Man Surrenders

A young Kansas Citian, 26-year-old Lee Junior Hayes, walked into the city police station late last night and announced he believed he was wanted in three states for passing bad checks.

Hayes said he had served a jail sentence in Chicago for bad checks and since that time had put out worthless paper in Chicago, New York and Connecticut.

# Lakeview Conservation Vote Saturday

LAKEVIEW, Aug. 27 — A referendum election among the landowners of southwestern Lake county will be held Saturday, November 1, to determine enlargement of the Lakeview soil conservation district according to plans made Friday night, August 19, at a public hearing.

There were no protests to the proposal. The hearing was conducted by Bill Teutsch, Corvallis, of the extension service and a member of the state soil conservation committee.

The present district includes about 83,000 acres in the Westside and New Idaho districts. If enlarged according to plan, it will include an area about 34 miles square.
