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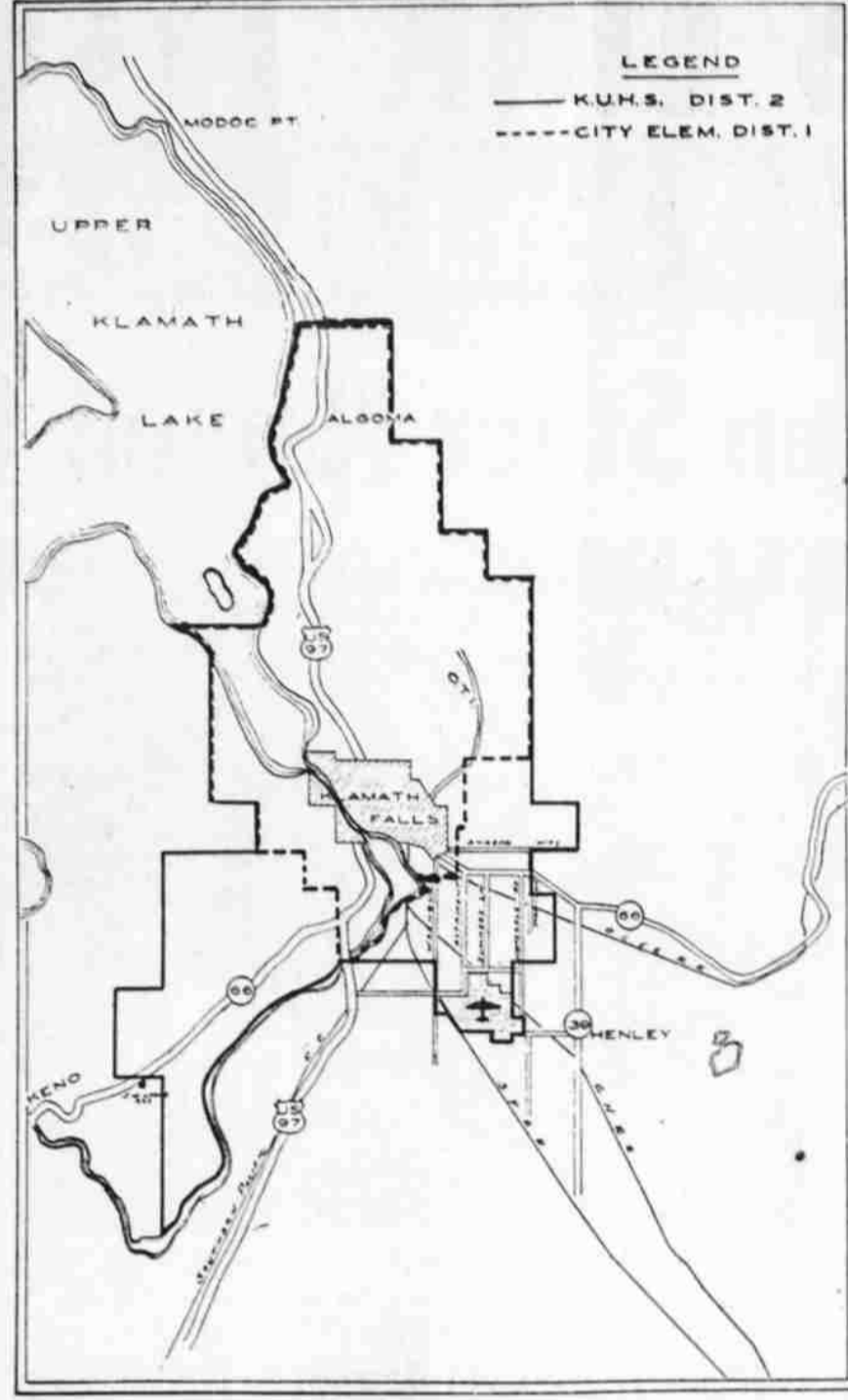

KINGMAN, Ariz., Aug. 30 (AP)—Two absent-minded motorists are doing some tall explaining today.

Shortly before 12:30 this morning a car drove into a filling station here. Two men got out of the front seat and decided to have some coffee. They left their wives sleeping in the back seat.

Shortly afterward the wives woke up and left the car. The husbands returned and drove off.

At 12:34 the highway patrol was given a stop order on the car—bearing an Illinois license. It was headed east.

At 2:40 a highway patrolman stopped the car near Selman. After a hasty telephone call, the wives took the bus at Kingman while their husbands waited for them at Selman—87 miles away.

Mole Foe Wins Scientific Honor

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—Last year Al W. Moore, fish and wildlife service biologist at Portland, worked out a new way to killing moles—with poisoned angworms.

His method, using worms dipped in a solution of 1960—a powerful new rodenticide—is being used successfully in both fields and nurseries in two Oregon counties, the agency said. It cleans out heavy infestations of moles within 90 days.

Recently, the agency added, Moore discovered a new species of gopher flea. It was named in his honor—Dactylopyllia Moorei.

Blaze Destroys Safeway Storage

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30 (AP)—A spectacular fire which virtually destroyed the block square warehouse of the Safeway Stores, Inc., was reported under control by the fire department early today.

Estimates of damage were about \$1,500,000 for the blaze, which raged for nearly six hours through the huge structure.

Four firemen were overcome with smoke and were rushed to hospitals after receiving emergency treatment.

The Christophers Are Out To Change World's Pattern

NEW YORK, Aug. 30 (AP)—When James Keller says he's out to change the world, a lot of people listen.

For one thing, he's a big, quietly persuasive Catholic priest with a non-nonsense air about him. He resembles his friend Spencer Tracy.

For another thing, he's a best-selling author who has banded more than 100,000 Catholics, Protestants and Jews into a movement called the "Christophers."

Their aim, in their own words: "To change the world."

"The U.S.," Father Keller says, "is being undermined by a fanatical group of men and women who

hate God and sneer at the declaration of independence, with its stress on our God-given rights.

"We want to stop this. "And we hope to do it by putting men and women of good will into jobs where they can be a force for good and order.

"There has been too much shouting against 'subversives.' "The time is here for action—for offering something better than the subversives can offer."

The Christophers are in the news on several fronts.

A novel which won the \$15,000 first prize in their literary contest has just been published. Its title is "Call It Treason." The author, George Howe, is a Protestant.

The Christophers are trying to establish training schools in all parts of the country, to guide "men and women of good will" into key jobs where they can make their influence felt.

And Father Keller himself is reading final proofs on a new book, "Three Minutes a Day," to be published by Doubleday in October. His last book, "You Can Change the World," sold 200,000 copies.

I went to see Father Keller because I had been hearing a good deal about misunderstanding and had feelings among religious groups, and I wanted to know if there was another side to the story.

"The man in the Roman collar is sure that there is.

"The Christophers," he said, "are people of all faiths. Some have no particular faith.

"We're all sorts of people—housewives, actors, employees, union officials.

"We concentrate on a few fields—teaching, government work, labor-management, and the spreading of ideas by radio, movies, publishing and so on.

"Why? Because that's where subversives are most active.

"By 'subversives' we don't mean communists alone. We mean those who are against what normal decent Americans are for. Such things as divine truth and human integrity.

"Probably not more than one American in 100 is working against these things. But that adds up to more than 1,000,000 persons. It means that we'll need more than 1,000,000 Christophers."

I asked a couple of questions that a Protestant friend of mine had suggested. Is there opposition to the Christophers because their founder is a priest? Any suspicion that its aims are sectarian?

Father Keller smiled. "Why don't you look over some of our correspondence?" he said.

So I did. There were letters of support from Catholics; from a Methodist ministerial student in Georgetown, Texas; from an Episcopal rector in Beverly Hills, Calif.; from a Jewish television executive in Chicago.

I read the letters and others like them.

"Father," I asked, "are you going to get a million Christophers? Are they really going to change the world?"

"With God's help," said Father Keller promptly. "Yes."

Suicide Takes Life in Vatican

VATICAN CITY, Aug. 30 (AP)—St. Peter's basilica was reconsecrated last night after a young Italian hurried 170 feet to his death from the walk around the inner dome.

The dead man was identified as Luigi Galafate of Rome. His body landed near the gold-encrusted high altar before praying pilgrims.

The massive doors of St. Peter's were quickly shut and Vatican gendarmes stood guard. Four hours later, St. Peter's was reconsecrated, its keeping with custom involving desecration of holy places.

Mons. Leone Gromler, canon of the altar of St. Peter's, performed the ceremony. He poured holy oil on the high altar near where the body fell.

An Italian lawyer committed suicide in a leap from the inner dome last November 17.
