# Stocks Fail To Move Up

NEW YORK, Aug. 31 (AP)—The stock market made a feeble attempt to move ahead today but the try didn't get very far. Demand was highly selective. At the final bell, though, small gains and losses were thoroughly scrambled.

Trading activity was about on a par with recent plodding session. Turnover hit a rate of about 700,000 shares for the full session, although this figure was somewhat deceptive because it included one 50,000-share block of Commonwealth and Southern and several blocks of around 10,000 shares of United Corp.

# Wheat Shows New Strength

CHICAGO, Aug. 31 (AP)—Wheat showed some underlying strength on the board of trade today despite prospects of large deliveries of cash grain on September contracts tomorrow. It was estimated that around 1,000,000 bushels would be tendered on these contracts.

Chief support for the bread cereal came from an advance in the government buying price for cash wheat and indications of some pickup in flour business. Minneapolis wheat was stronger than here. Family flour prices will be raised tomorrow, a condition which brought flour trading today.

Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 higher, September \$2.00 1/2-1/4, corn was 1/2 lower to 3/4 higher, September \$1.25 1/2-1/4, oats were unchanged to higher, September 67-67 1/2, rye was 1 1/2-3/4 higher, September \$1.39 1/2-1/4, soybeans were 3 to 4 cents higher, November \$2.34 1/2-1/4, and lard was 10 to 25 cents a hundred pounds higher, September \$12.12.
