

Welcome Wagon Aids Community

If you are a newcomer in Klamath Falls you may find a caller on your doorstep one of these days. And that pleasant caller will be from the Welcome Wagon. Mrs. Carl Mason, who is now heading the Welcome Wagon service here, spends her time visiting new people who have settled in Klamath Falls.

The Welcome Wagon idea was begun by Thomas W. Briggs of Memphis, Tenn., who was a newspaper man there. He was also a student of history and during his studies he became impressed with the welcoming service that the pioneers of the early west gave new settlers. Since the early settlers fervently hoped that new people would come to join them, when they received word that new people were on their way to their settlement, they sent a woman out to welcome them.

Briggs felt that the idea was well worth keeping and that it could be used to help newcomers feel more at home and that they could become assimilated into the community more quickly.

The Welcome Wagon service grew and, since its conception in 1928, it now is international with service in 800 cities, some of which are in Canada, Australia and South America.

The service which was originally intended for newcomers in order to make them happy in their new community, has now been extended to engaged girls and mothers of new babies. The newest service is calling upon young ladies on their sixteenth birthday.

The Welcome Wagon association hopes that these young people will remain in the community where they were warmly received.

Mrs. Mason, who has been with the Welcome service since March, was trained in the Welcome Wagon school in Hollywood, Calif. She has lived in Klamath Falls since 1929 and is well acquainted with the people and the city.

She has stressed that while the service tries to find all newcomers in the community some are undoubtedly overlooked. She appreciates phone calls when a citizen in town notices a newcomer here.
