

# OC&E Strike Holds; No Break Seen

The Oregon, California and Eastern railroad strike was in its third day today with no settlement in sight.

The 13 operating employees of the 65-mile OC&E road stopped work Monday morning to back up grievances of the Order of Railway Conductors and the strike is beginning to pinch economically.

Weyerhaeuser Timber company, largest patron of the line, was reportedly stacking up cars of logs at the Bly end of the OC&E, unable to move them to the mill at Klamath Falls; grain growers in the Dairy-Langell valley area are in the midst of harvest and are anxious to get the dispute settled so grain shipments can be made, and industrial users of OC&E are eyeing idle loaded cars.

The conductors' organization struck OC&E on six points of dispute, four of them pay claims totaling several thousand dollars and one claim for hospital and medical expenses of an injured employee.

The other point of friction is a request for a 10-hour rest period for workers after 12 hours or more on duty.

OC&E is owned jointly by Great Northern and Southern Pacific but the operation currently is in the hands of the GN.

Great Northern officials here are keeping hands off the strike, leaving any move toward settlement to the railroad's higher authorities, and the Southern Pacific reportedly has one high official here today. He is J. W. Corbett, vice president in charge of operations of the SP's Pacific lines and likewise vice president of OC&E. The GN's L. E. Manion, who is president of OC&E, reportedly left Seattle yesterday and may be coming to Klamath Falls to look into the strike.

Two union officers, G. W. Lange and G. G. McLennan, have been here since Monday, staying at the Arcade hotel. They reported themselves still ready to meet with railroad officials in an attempt to settle the trouble.

Lange is vice president of the Order of Railway Conductors and McLennan is general chairman of a committee of adjustment for the organization. They said today that even though the OC&E strike is by just 13 employees, the same attention was being given it as "two would give one on the Southern Pacific with two thousand conductors."

OC&E has been operating two locomotives, one used primarily for switching and the other making the run out to Bly. The locomotives, owned by GN, are idled in the GN roundhouse.

## Report Rent Office Here To Be Closed

The Associated Press today announced that the Klamath Falls area rent office is one of 12 Oregon and Washington rent control offices to be closed, although no official confirmation had reached this city at noon today.

The curtailment of rental activities was given as the reason for the closures by Regional Housing Expediter Ward Cox in San Francisco.

Operations of the closed offices would be transferred to the nearest remaining office open although no employees would be moved, the report said.

Oregon offices to be closed, in addition to Klamath Falls, are Pendleton, Corvallis, Roseburg and Astoria.

Washington offices affected the Pullman, Wenatchee, Bellingham, Everett, Olympia and Longview-Kelso.

The announcement of the closure of these offices added fuel to the belief that Klamath Falls will soon be decontrolled by government action. However, the city is going ahead with its mass meeting to discuss rent control, scheduled for September 14, at 7:30 p. m. in the city council chambers.

There were some rumors this morning that a radio report said that Klamath Falls and Astoria had already been decontrolled although the area rent office here had received no word to confirm the rumor.
