CHICAGO, Aug. 31 (AP)—Bathing beach attire is banned at Chicago's museum of science and industry. So the museum added a stock of a half-dozen wrap-on skirts for women visitors wearing bathing suits or shorts. Bathers from near-by Jackson park beach on Chicago's South Side frequently entered the museum in scanty wear.

Mrs. Martha McGrew, of the museum staff, said that, although officials aren't against such brevity, they didn't consider the museum a proper place to wear play clothing. But on one occasion the spare skirts weren't needed. Girl guides at the museum entrance halted six teen-age girls. Children under 12 are permitted to enter wearing brief apparel.

One girl, Mrs. McGrew said, was overage. A younger girl was appropriately dressed. None would enter unless all were admitted. The girls went into a huddle. They disappeared and soon returned.

All were passed through the entrance. The older girl had exchanged costumes with the appropriately clothed 12-year-old.

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BIG EXPANSION
 ST. HELENS, Aug. 31 (AP)—The St. Helens Pulp and Paper company is installing nearly \$1,000,000 of new machinery and plans to add 30 more men to its 600 employes. The improvement program includes a modernized specialty paper machine, a new transformer, eight bag machines, and five more digesters.

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
