

Legume Seed Yield Down Over Oregon

PORTLAND, Aug. 31 (AP)—Higher ryegrass yields have boosted the Oregon crop to 49,000,000 pounds compared with 34,000,000 last year. But the federal crop reporting service said legume seed yields were down.

A severe winter and late spring frosts were blamed for the drop of legume seeds to 113,000,000 pounds. The crop represents about 68 per cent of the nation's supply.

The department of agriculture's weekly bulletin said hairy vetch would total about 14,500,000 pounds, down 400,000 from last year. Common and Willamette vetch was estimated at 11,500,000 pounds, less than half the 1948 output.

Although plantings of Austrian peas were increased 17,000 acres, the harvest will be 29,600,000 pounds, only 4,600,000 above a year ago. Hungarian vetch output was estimated at 620,000 pounds compared with 1,100,000 last year.

Support prices for the 1950 crop will be based on parity prices as of April 1, 1950, the department announced.

The agency said that if parity prices next April are the same as those of July 15, the average support levels for top grade seed would be as follows: hairy vetch 13.34 cents a pound; common vetch 6.34 cents; Willamette vetch 6.34 cents; crimson clover 16.03 cents; common ryegrass 7.09 cents; Austrian winter peas 4.62 cents.

These would be slightly under 1949 support prices.

Africans, Japs Hold Long Mark

PORTLAND, Aug. 31 (AP)—California motorist outnumber visitors from out-of-Oregon to Bonneville dam, but South Africa and Japan have the distance records.

On a one-week traffic check at the dam, 5887 cars stopped at the dam. Oregon cars led with 1778, followed by California 1402, Washington 732, Iowa 146, Illinois 134, Nebraska 118, Texas 104, Canada 104 and Idaho 100. There were six cars from Hawaii, three from Alaska, and one each from the canal zone, Japan and South Africa.

Portland TV Possible Soon

PORTLAND, Aug. 31 (AP)—Television for Portland won't be held up by plans for ultra high frequency channels.

Stuart L. Bailey, national president of the Institute of Radio Engineers, said here yesterday that when the Federal Communications commission lifts the present ban on new stations—expected to be around the first of the year—several of the currently used very high frequency channels will be available to Portland applicants.

The ultra high frequency channels, planned for the future, will require equipment development and may not be in use for several years, he said. Receivers for very high frequency will be able to tune to ultra frequency by means of a converter, he said.

Bailey pointed out that more channels are needed because telecasts are reaching greater distances than originally expected. He said that while the FCC at first

planned to limit TV licenses to cities which could be expected to support them financially, it now plans to authorize them in smaller cities. Its aim, he said, is to have TV available to everyone in the country.

Missouri Waltz Not For Margaret

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 31 (AP)—Miss Margaret Truman let it be known she doesn't like the Missouri Waltz, recently adopted as the official Missouri state song.

While changing trains here en route from Independence to New York, she confided to reporters the new state song won't be included in her repertoire for a 25-city concert tour this fall.

"I don't care if I never hear it again," she said. "It was greatly overworked at every whistle stop during the campaign last fall."
