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Paper Firm Shows Loss In Profits

NEW YORK, Aug. 31 (AP)—Crown Zellerbach corporation reported net profit of \$4,009,600 for the quarter ended July 31, equal to \$1.28 a common share. Net for the like quarter a year ago was \$4,288,628, or \$1.45 a share. Net sales for the recent period were \$40,238,423 a year ago.

Consolidated Vultee Aircraft corporation, producer of the B-36 bomber and the Convair-liner passenger

planes, today reported net profit of \$1,585,327, or 68 cents a common share, for the six months ended May 31. This compares with a loss of \$7,334,419 for the like period of 1948.

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
