

Owls Sign For Fort Lewis Game Sept. 17

Three Roosevelt Stars Join Oregon Tech Grid Roster

The addition of three Portland high school grid stars to the Oregon Tech Owls' roster and the signing for an opening football clash with the Fort Lewis, Wash., eleven were highlight developments on the mile high gridiron this week as Dale Daugherty drives his charges through conditioning drills.

The game with Fort Lewis has been on the on again off again stage for the last two weeks but O'Connell said it would definitely be played September 17 at Fort Lewis.

Yesterday's additions to the Owl squad were three boys who starred for Portland's Roosevelt high school last year. They are Ken Miller, halfback and end; Dick Mill, center, and Jack Taylor, quarterback.

Dickering with Fort Lewis caused postponement of the proposed game between ex-KUHS players and the Owls.

Daugherty said this week the Owls are shaping up into a tough squad that will be able to cope with competition from colleges and junior colleges of Oregon and California.

The backs are blending into Daugherty's T formation in line style. Main difference between this year's Owl attack and last year's is the complete spin the quarterback takes from his behind-the-center position.

This maneuver makes for more deception and is designed to spring the fast backs into the open field. No definite word has been received from Clarence Adams, Fred Hess or Bob Redkey, all of whom may be back in Owl uniforms this year.

Stickout breakout runner for the Owls this year may be Chuck Warren, all-star football and basketball performer from Ashland high school. Warren was a standout player on this year's OTI cage squad.

Other back candidates include Richard Nason, from Glendale high school in California; Odis Elder, last year's OTI end, now working at quarter; Glen Lewis Jr., from Salem high school; Carl Dudley, from Linfield college; Billy McDow, now injured but expected to see action at halfback spot when he heals; Leo Burgett, from Sacred Heart academy in Redmond; plays both end and quarter; and Halfbacks Louis Smiles, from Texas; Cecil Colgrove, from Lewiston, Ida.; and Ansel Reisch, Melalla high school ace.

Daugherty could field a forward wall averaging 190 pounds with a wealth of high school and service team performers now enrolled in school.

Bill Daugherty, last season's first string quarterback, is working as assistant coach.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 31 (AP)—Jaroslav Drobny, the man without a country, wanted to adopt the United States, and play tennis on this side of the Atlantic as long as he can lift a racket.

"If I can obtain permission to stay here permanently, I will apply for U. S. citizenship," Drobny said in an interview while awaiting his second round match today in the national tennis championships.

Disgusted with the communist regime, Drobny and his former Davis Cup doubles partner, Vladimir Cernik, turned their backs on their native Czechoslovakia several weeks ago.

Thanks to Gil Hodges, the Brooklyn Dodgers are only a game and a half behind the St. Louis Cardinals in the rugged National league race.

Hodges, probably the best first baseman in the league although he is playing his first full season at the job, is giving Jackie Robinson a run for his money as the most valuable Dodger. He is hitting only .294, but his sense of timing is terrific.

Rex Barney, struggling to redeem himself, after flopping badly all season, trailed Murry Dickson 3-2 in the ninth inning yesterday when big Gil did his stuff. There was a runner on first and one out.

Hodges slammed a Dickson go-pfer ball special into the left field seats for his 21st homer to break up the ball game. That ruined Dickson's budding win streak and handed Pittsburgh a 4-3 loss.

The Cards' season-long "cousins," the Boston Braves, turned on their old tormentors to blast St. Louis, 12-4. In addition to the loss, their fifth in 20 meetings with the 1948 champs, the Cards were crippled by an injury to Pitcher Red Munger. The husky righthanded winner of 12 games left the game after he pulled a side muscle batting in the third.

Other National leaguers were idle.

The crippled New York Yankees lost a full game of their American league lead, which now measured three games, by dropping a 6-2 decision to the aroused St. Louis Browns. Runner-up Boston blanked Detroit, 3-0, behind Ellis Kinder to

snip the Tigers' eight game win string.

Yankee Ed Lopat was knocked out in the fourth inning with Stan Spence's second straight double. Rookie Roy Sievers was the batting star, knocking in three Brownie runs to ease Al Papala's pitching job. Lopat's third inning homer was the only Yank score off Papal until the seventh.

BIRD HOSPITAL SET UP TO AID DUCKS HIT BY BOTULISM PLAGUE

The botulism outbreak on the Lower Klamath wildlife refuge shows no sign of breaking and volunteer help is being called to assist in picking up alive, infected birds.

Botulism has killed an estimated 5000 ducks on Lower Klamath this summer and the scourge is not expected to break until cooler weather comes.

A "bird hospital" is being operated on the Tule refuge by the fish and wildlife service and an anti-toxin is being used to bring back birds that are picked up almost dead. The anti-toxin is said to be much more efficient than potas-

sium permanganate used in treating sick birds last year.

Hundreds of birds are being saved at the hospital and all crewmen of the refuges are working to save ducks. Volunteer helpers are picking up "limbernecks" on the shore and around the marshes of Lower Klamath and more workers can be used in the rescue operation. Men are particularly needed over the holidays, Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

Various organizations here in town have already volunteered help. KFFA is sending two men and help is being donated by J. W. Kerns, Balsiger, Fyock's Electric,
