

Klamath Falls Pennant Hopes Almost Dead

Gems Tumble Six Games Back In Willows Defeat

WILLOWS, Aug. 31 (Special)—To all intents and purposes, the Klamath Falls pennant hopes are almost dead. The team finished last night with a 6-4 defeat at the hands of the Willows Cardinals. The Cards nipped second-place Klamath Falls 5-4 to throw the Gems six games back of the Diamonds. Pittsburg won over Redding 4-0 behind the four-hit tossing of Lou Bronzan and has the league championship virtually in the bag. The Diamonds have seven games to play.

Last year the Pittsburg club finished last and spent most of the latter part of the season as a homeless road club. New owner Vince Day decided that his hometown deserved a winner and the Diamonds have been that most of this year.

Here at Willows last night the Gems made a valorous effort at staying in the game but the Cardinals came up with four infield double plays to effectively throttle that many potential rallies.

In the top of the ninth with one run already across and trailing 5-4, the Gems had two runners aboard when Elwyn Elton grounded into a twin-killing that ended the game. Mike Rivera was the principal Doria in the side of the Gems. The Willows third sacker hit two doubles and two singles in four times at bat and drove in four runs. In the third frame he doubled with the bases loaded to bat home three runs.

Chuck Schildmeyer, Gems starting pitcher, fanned 10 and gave up only seven hits before being removed in the eighth for a pinch-hitter. He was the loser. Lee Freese, the winner, went out in the ninth and Fred Pass, Willows' manager, came in to force Elton into the double play.
