INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 2 (AP)—The Grand Army of the Republic broke up for the last time yesterday.

There was a final clasp of shaking old hands last night, a godsend from their commander and a prayer.

Today six old veterans are scattering never to meet again, at least in formal encampment. They signed and sealed the decision in their only business session yesterday.

Then for more than an hour, veterans of later wars marched behind the separate cars in which the six tired old soldiers rode in a twilight parade. Almost 100,000 thronged the curbs along the 12-block route, cheering the aged men in their last blaze of martial glory.

The war memories were few and fleeting in the "campfire" session that closed the 83rd and last encampment. "I was a drum major," offered Albert Woolson, 102, Duluth, Minn., who was named junior vice-commander yesterday.

Theodore A. Penland, 106, Vancouver, Wash., waved happily from the back of an automobile seat all along the parade route. At the "campfire," he bravely sang "Tenting on the Old Campground."

Penland proudly received a diamond-studded past commander's badge, though he'll now be commander for life. The badge, pinned on his blue uniform by the grandson, Eldon C. Geyer, East Lansing, Mich., recognizes his service for the past year.

For the other centenarians, any war memories were crowded out by the present and the uncertainties of life.

"I have a hobby," reported James A. Hard, 108, Rochester, N. Y., "to receive a kiss from most of the ladies in the land."

"I am among all my friends," said Joseph Closs, 105-year-old Negro veteran from Pontiac, Mich. "White friends," he added with a happy smile. "I hope we shall all meet in Heaven together."

"I get pretty tired," apologized Robert Barrett, 102, Princeton, Ky. Chatty Charles L. Chappel, 103, Long Beach, Calif., didn't get to the farewell ceremony. He was warned to take it easy after collapsing Monday night.

SALEM, Sept. 2 (AP)—A Marion county deputy sheriff, William de Vall, was credited yesterday with saving the life of a 12-year-old boy who was stricken with dysentery.

'An Apple A Day' Or Try Six Oysters

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (AP)—Six oysters a day will help keep the doctor away.

The word comes from the fish and wildlife service. In its annual announcement heralding the start of the R-months oyster season, the agency said an average serving of six oysters will supply:

1. More than the daily requirements of iron and copper.
2. About half the requirements of iodine.
3. About one-tenth of the needed protein, calcium, magnesium, phosphorus, vitamin A, thiamine, riboflavin and niacin.

"To make a completely rounded meal from a nutritional standpoint, only additional sources of calories are needed," the service said.
