

Crucial Series Opens Tonight

Schedules Favor Cards, Yanks

Brooklyn Divides Twin Bill

The Redbirds are roosting pretty today.

Eddie Dyer's St. Louis Cardinals never were better off. Not only are they leading the Brooklyn Dodgers by two full games, but the remaining schedule is all in their favor.

The Cards have 27 games left to play, and 18 of them are at home. On the other hand, the second place Brooks must play 17 of their remaining 27 games on foreign fields.

Furthermore, 13 of the Cards' games are against the seventh and eighth place Cincinnati and Chicago clubs. They've already won 21 out of 31 from these basement bargains.

The Brooks have to play with the third and fourth place Boston and New York teams. They've played under .500 ball against these first divisioners, winning 15 and losing 16 to the Giants and Braves.

In the American league, it is likely the seven games between the league leading New York Yankees and runners-up Boston Red Sox will settle the issue. The Red Sox trail the Yankees by three games. Their chances are not bright by any means, but they're not as dark as those of the Dodgers.

Boston plays 14 of its remaining 25 games at home, but the Yankees play 23 of their 28 games at friendly Yankee stadium.

BUMS SPLIT
Both runners-up lost ground yesterday. The Dodgers got off on the right foot, outscoring Cincinnati, 11-8, in the afternoon portion of a day-night doubleheader. The Reds bounced back, however, to upset the Dodgers, 4-3, in the 10-inning nightcap. At the same time, the Cardinals were knocking off the Phillies in Philadelphia 4-0, to pick up half a length on the Brooks. Howie Pollet spun a five-hitter for his 17th victory.

The Red Sox led with their ace-20-game winner Mel Parnell—but they were trumped by the Detroit Tigers, who shut them out, 7-0, behind the seven-hit pitching of Art Houtteman.

The Yankees came through with their patented "squeaker," a wobbly 4-3 victory over the Browns in St. Louis. Tommy Byrne picked up his 12th victory but needed help from Ace Fireman Joe Page in the ninth.

The Cleveland Indians, baseball marathon champs, won another overtime tussle, edging out the Philadelphia Athletics, 2-1, in 11 innings. It was the Indians' 17th straight overtime victory and their 18th in 19 extra-inning games.

GUMPERT WINS
Randy Gumpert pitched the Chicago White Sox to a 3-0 win over Washington. Dick Wais's 13 walks helped the White Sox no end.

The third place Boston Braves in the National whipped the Chicago Cubs, 8-4, as Catcher Bill Skelied batted in five runs with a home run and two singles. Warren Spahn picked up his 17th pitching triumph. Despite Ralph Kiner's grand slam homer for Pittsburgh, the New York Giants defeated the Pirates, 9-5, on round trippers by Hank Thompson, Bobby Thomson and Billy Ripken. The Giants moved into fourth place, a half game over the Phils.

Burt Shotton, the usually mild-mannered manager of the Dodgers, was chased out of a ball game for the first time in three seasons with the club.

Connie Mack Recalls Old Baseball Days

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Connie Mack recalled his amateur days at East Brookfield, Mass., in 1883, and an owner named Tilden asking him if he wanted to play professionally. "I haven't heard from him since," laughed the 86-year-old manager of the Athletics, "and I'm beginning to suspect I won't. I guess he didn't think I had much of a future in baseball."

At the dinner bringing Connie Mack Day at Yankee stadium to a close, Mr. Mack told of five members of the Hartford club of the Eastern league being sold to the Washington Nationals in 1886 for \$75. Included were Gilmore and Mack, who gained fame as the Shadow Battery, because they were so tall and thin.

Mr. Mack spoke of his first training trip—to Charleston, when third-class hotels accepted ball-players provided they didn't mingle with the other guests. Manager Ted Sullivan put the club up at \$1 a day American plan, and no tipping.

No one ever had to ask "What-ever became of Connie Mack?" but the game between the old Yankees and Athletics gave you a good line on what happens to used-up ball-players.

John Franklin Baker was the oldest player on the field at 63. He's still a dirt farmer on Maryland's eastern shore.

Jimmy Fox was on first base for the veteran A's. In 1925 Home Run Baker, then manager of the Eastern club of the Eastern Shore league, walked into Mr. Mack's office in the Shibe Park tower with another sizable farm boy, this one only 17.

"Connie," said Baker, "I want you to take hold of a kid who is the greatest hitter you ever saw." "Frank," said Mr. Mack, "can he hit as well as you could?" "Better," responded Baker.

The new farm boy's name was Jimmy Fox, who now represents a Philadelphia brewery. Jumping Joe Dugan is in the same line of work in Boston.

Shortstop Jack Barry was the second member of the Philadelphia Americans immortal \$100,000 infield on the field and the second oldest player in the abbreviated game at 62. He coaches Holy Cross. Max Bishop drills Navy, and walked as usual. Lefty Gomez called him Five Strikes Bishop. Gomez sells sporting goods.

Lefty Grove runs a bowling alley in his old home town of Lonaconing, Md. Proprietor Mickey Cochrane of a Billings, Mont., dude ranch showed up wearing a sombrero. Wally Pipp is a manufacturers' agent in Grand Rapids.

Oregon Will Have No Special Deer Hunting Season

PORTLAND, Sept. 2 (AP) — The state game director reminded sportsmen today that Oregon will have no special deer hunting seasons this year.

C. A. Lockwood said one section of the Tillamook burn area will have a special archery hunt September 17-28, but there will be no special shooting season.

Two other areas will also be opened to archers: Part of the Canyon creek refuge on September 17-October 30, and the Mount Emily refuge in Union-Umatilla counties September 17-28.

Lost Clubs Reason Campbell Is U.S. Golfing Contender

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Sept. 2 (AP) Bill Campbell, the par-busting law maker from Huntington, W. Va., had to lose his golf clubs to become a real threat in the U. S. amateur championship.

"It happened in Chicago a year ago," the strapping former Princeton university athlete said in explaining why he's in the semifinals today at Oak Hill.

"I had a set of specially built clubs, long ones to fit my size. They were swiped from under my locker right after I'd won the Tam O'Shanter amateur championship.

"I went down and bought a set off the racks. They're regular size, a bit small for me. But I find I'm closer to the ball. I don't get as much distance but I'm far more accurate, and my game has improved."

Campbell, 26-year-old conservative democratic member of the West Virginia legislature, met Charlie Cox, the Walker Cup star from Oklahoma City, in one semifinal match today.

Willie Turnesa, the 35-year-old titleholder from Elmford, N. Y., plays Rufus King, Wichita Falls, Tex., cattle man and tournament "dark horse" in the other 36-hole duel.

The survivors will clash over Oak Hill's 6800 yards tomorrow for the 49th championship.

Pepper Ousted For 'Choking'
