

Davis Nabbed On Report Failure Count

TULELAKE, Calif., Sept. 3.—Edwin A. Davis, publisher of the Tulelake Reporter, was arrested here Friday and arraigned in justice court on charges of failing to file reports with the California employment department.

J. F. Wicher, auditor in charge of the Redding district office of the employment department, filed the complaint. He named nine counts against Davis, all having to do with alleged failure to file reports as required by law.

The charge is classed as a misdemeanor and each count carries a maximum penalty of \$500 fine and six months in jail.

Davis showed copies of several reports when taken before Justice of the Peace George Long here. The employment department officials asserted their records fail to show filings for several periods which are named in the complaint.

Judge Long released Davis on his own recognizance, and said a preliminary hearing will be held later. The publisher was not asked to plead at Friday's hearing.

DES MOINES, Sept. 3 (AP)—A battle over whether the Amvets organization should be merged with the American Veterans Committee (AVC) was shaping today as the 5th national Amvets convention officially opened here.

The Virginia department offered a resolution asking that the convention consider the consolidation of all other World War II veterans organizations with the Amvets.

However, the Colorado department of the Amvets notified the convention that it would withdraw if the convention approves the merger.

Reds Advance Near Canton

CANTON, Sept. 3 (AP)—A division of Nationalist troops was rushed out today to meet 2000 to 3000 Red irregulars who were fighting toward Tsungta, only 35 miles north-east of Canton.

The irregulars, armed by the regular Chinese communist armies farther north, were striking far behind the front lines. This disruptive action had been feared by the Nationalist command.

The main front, which nowhere is nearer than 140 miles, remained relatively unchanged. Canton itself was calm.

The complaint against Black was signed by Wilma Graves who said the man threatened her with a knife.

Coast Range Faces Fire Danger

ASTORIA, Sept. 3 (AP)—Residents along the coast range today reported the worst fire danger and the lowest water table in years.

"The Nehalem river is so low in places that the rocks are showing above surface that old timers say haven't shown in 45 years," Harold Teale, deputy fire warden, said.

He said the forests were drier than at any time in the past five years.

DALLAS, Tex., Sept. 3 (AP)—A disappointed college boy suitor walked into a downtown office building here yesterday and killed a pretty Dallas secretary after she told him she was to marry another man.

Federal Board Frets About Misleading Ads

NEW YORK, Sept. 3 (AP)—Keeping the public from being misled by what it sees in the ads is one of the jobs of the federal trade commission. It has just gone to bat for the girl who acquires her curly locks at home.

The FTC says that the twin in the ubiquitous home wave ad had the help of a pro in setting her hair, and it thinks the ad should have said so. But, how many persons ever supposed she did it herself? For that matter, how many really expect that the product they buy will look as glamorous as in the pictures on the table?

Noting editorially that the FTC is getting mighty particular, the Wall Street Journal asks it to inspect a ten dollar bill, which says on its face that it is "redeemable in lawful money at the United States treasury." The paper suggests the commissioners "go over to the treasury and see what they get."

The general public probably is just as blasé about the product ads it reads as it is about no longer getting gold, or "lawful money" for a paper bill.

When you see a railroad ad picturing a happy family gazing out the beautiful window at the beautiful river, do you think that view is guaranteed—that you might not find yourself on the other side of the car, looking at cut banks and slurs?

Are the airlines to blame that they don't always furnish that beautiful seat companion you see in their ads? Or that the well-behaved child in the ad turns out to be your own junior getting airsick?

Most husbands, looking at the flour ads showing mouth-watering triumphs prepared at home, know well enough that the little woman is just as apt to produce a fallen cake, or biscuits that call for a meat axe.

And the bathing suit ads—Adonis and Venus running hand in hand with a little cherub trailing. Oh, well, just take a look for yourself at any beach.
