

# Zweybruck Speaker At Soroptimist

The Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls met Thursday at 12:15 at the Pelican party room. At this regular meeting, the special program was arranged by Program Chairman Blanche Lundy with Lorraine Johnson as chairman of the day.

The first speaker was Peggy Williams, who has been a teacher of art but has recently turned to research in native arts and crafts. She has been studying and gathering material for lectures in Mexico, and has spent much time taking colored slides to illustrate points in color, design, and composition. She informed the group that she had some excellent slides of Klamath Falls, and Crater Lake to take back with her. She was an assistant to Professor Emmy Zweybruck this summer at the art school at OTI.

Next, the second speaker and daughter of Professor Zweybruck, spoke of the hospitality shown them while in Klamath Falls. The interest, enthusiasm, friendliness, and talent of the people she met during her stay in the city had made a deep impression on her and she expressed a desire to return again. She was especially generous in her praise of the Klamath high school students she had in her courses at OTI.

She made a number of paintings of scenes in Klamath county for her exhibit in New York and this fall she will display her work at the Municipal Art Gallery of New York City. She is director of the textile department of the school of fine and industrial division of the American Crayon company in New York and is considered as one of the best.

The last speaker was Professor Emmy Zweybruck who was the director of the art school here this summer.

From 1931 to 1937 Professor Zweybruck came to the United States each year from Vienna for a series of lecture tours through the country. She had promised her daughter that she would be educated in the United States. On her last visit in 1937 she received permission to bring her daughter to the United States, where she enrolled her in school.

They remained here and she has contributed much to this country in the way of art. She told the group that they were indeed fortunate to live out here in the west where everything is comparatively new. She feels that since we are not handicapped by traditions it gives us a chance to go far in modern art and design.

## Baking Failures?

If cakes come out of the oven pale and flabby, coarse in texture or burned around the edges, chances are the oven temperature is to blame.

If the oven has no thermostat, the difficulty probably lies in attempting to guess the proper temperatures. In ovens with thermostatic controls, it may be that the controls need checking and re-setting.

In either case, a portable oven thermometer is an excellent guide to accurate baking temperatures. In using the oven without a control, a glance at the thermometer indicates when the oven heat should be raised or lowered to keep a constant temperature. The thermometer is also useful in testing the accuracy of the oven with thermostatic controls.

Choose an oven thermometer that takes up a minimum of space and doesn't interfere with the arrangement of baking pans. One that is black enameled metal with shiny chrome trim. It has a round, clock-like face printed with black, easy-to-read figures. Small and compact, this thermometer is designed to stand on, or hang from, the oven racks.

To use, hang or stand the thermometer on the oven rack on which the food is to be baked. Turn the heat on high to pre-heat the oven to the desired temperature. Then lower the heat to keep the temperature constant. It will be necessary to peek at the thermometer during the baking period to be certain that the heat is correctly adjusted. However, a thermometer and a little careful attention will be a sure cure for baking failures caused by incorrect temperatures.

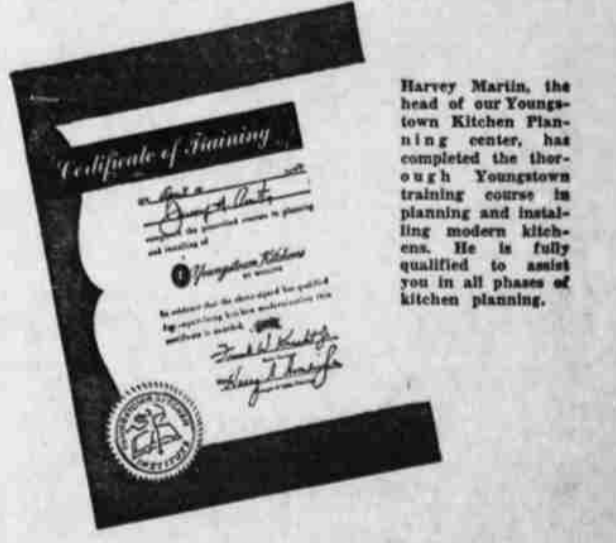
