

### Three Prison Sentences Given Here

Three men were given prison sentences in circuit court this morning, bringing the total committed to the Oregon state pen from Klamath county this year to 32.

Those sentenced were: Albert H. Steiner, 34, 18 years for larceny by bailies.

Jurgen Henry Fryor, 40, three years for obtaining money by false pretenses.

James Robert Powers, 64, five years for obtaining money by false pretenses.

Another man in for writing bad checks, James Wilson Havana Jr., 27, was placed on probation for three years with instructions to pay off two checks he passed at Chemult, totaling \$10, and with tacit advice to forget two others.

The latter, both for \$5, were written in the course of a blackjack game at a Chemult tavern. Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg told Havana he wouldn't order checks written in a gambling game be made good.

Fryor, Judge Vandenberg revealed, was in trouble not only for passing bad checks but for drawing and spending money belonging to two minor orphan children representing himself to be their father.

Fryor said the children had been put out for adoption in Coeur d'Alene, Ida., and that he hadn't seen them for two years, but that he had represented himself as their father last January.

Steiner, from Los Angeles and a San Quentin ex-convict, pleaded guilty to failure to return a rented car to the Falls Appliance company here. He took the automobile to Reno.

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### Tulelake Duo Charged With Armed Theft

TULELAKE, Sept. 6—Two men are held in the Siskiyou county jail in Yreka charged with strong armed robbery and a 60-year-old ranch hand in the Siskiyou Central hospital suffering from serious head injuries, allegedly received at the hands of the pair.

Injured is William Duell, 60, employed as mechanic on the William Kandra farm.

In jail are two Tulelake men, identified by Chief of Police O. E. Pedersen as Warner Trumble, 42, and John Ross Casey, restaurant cook.

Chief Pedersen said Duell was found about 10 o'clock Saturday morning by a maid at the Clyde hotel. He was unconscious, his jaw fractured in several places and his head lacerated. Following medical care here he was moved by the Tulelake ambulance to Yreka. He is not thought to be critically hurt.

Chief Pedersen was advised that two men were overheard discussing the assault, and arrest of Casey and Trumble followed.

Both men admitted jail records. Chief Pedersen said Casey is said to have told the chief he served time in the Oregon state penitentiary for one year following conviction at Roseburg, Ore., on a robbery charge. He was released June 24, 1949, and has been in Tulelake since that time.

Trumble, the chief said, has served time on two occasions at Huntsville, Tex.

Duell's wallet, which he said had held some \$200, was found empty in the lavatory in Duell's hotel room.

Casey and Trumble will appear in Justice of the Peace George Long's court for arraignment this week. Chief Pedersen was aided in the investigation by Deputy Sheriff Pete Sorenson.

The trio includes Floyd Wilson, 20, and Orville Wright, 35, both of Chiloquin, and Stanley John 24, Nubeber. Wilson is known as Billy Sunday prizefighter.

Shortly after their arrest, Chief of Police O. E. Pedersen said charges of strong armed robbery would be investigated against the three following complaint of Clifton Armstrong, 35, Sacramento, who said the men beat him and took \$10 from his person.

The three appeared Tuesday morning before Police Judge Victoria Thaler.

Big crowds were on hand for all events of the three-day show, over which Queen Anne Barry of Lakeview reigned.

Silver buckles were awarded winners of the two feature events, bronc riding and calf roping. A buckle donated by Charlie Read's Saddlery of Klamath Falls went to Richard Fairchild, Lassen county, champion bronc rider of the show.

Herman Vowell of Harney county was top man in calf roping with a time of 1:37 seconds. He won a silver buckle from Drew's Man's Store in Klamath Falls for his efforts. Fairchild was second with a time of 27.5.

Winners for the first day of bronc riding were, Fairchild, first; John Barry, Lakeview, second, and Ralph DeGarmo, Ft. Bidwell, third.

For the second day, winners were Fairchild, first, Don Huggett, Harney county, second, and Wayne Smith, Klamath county, third. Final winners were Jim Carlson, Sumner Lake, first; Fairchild, second; and Wayne Smith, third.

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### Lake County Stock Sale Nets \$13,213

LAKEVIEW, Sept. 6—Lake county's 10th annual Rotary sponsored Junior Livestock sale wound up over the week-end with 63 animals bringing a grand total of \$13,213.

The total was considerably less than last year's \$22,000, but 80 animals were entered and sold by 4-H and FFA youngsters in the 1948 sale.

Bob Rhodes of Klamath Falls was auctioneer, donating his services for the sale.

Top price in hogs was 65 cents a pound paid by Benny Wilkerson, exalted ruler, on behalf of the Lakeview Elks lodge for James Lee's FFA grand champion hogs weighing 155 pounds.

The 4-H grand champion hog, owned by Elizabeth Cannon brought 60 cents a pound for his 201 pounds from the Lakeview Waiver Users. Total for hog sales was \$1498.21 for 17 hogs.

In sheep the top price of \$1.30 a pound was paid by Carl Lang of Lakeview sales company for Ivy Nelson's 4-H grand champion weighing 114 pounds.

The FFA grand champion, owned by Clifford Bush, went to the Favell-Ulley Realty company for \$1.18 a pound. The animal weighed 121 pounds.

Sixteen sheep brought a total of \$1227.22.

Inner-State Cooperatives paid 35 cents per pound, top price, for the FFA grand champion steer owned by Marvin Armes. The animal weighed 1022 pounds.

The 4-H grand champion steer brought 43 cents per pound and was bought by the Fremont Sawmill company of Lakeview. The animal was owned by Carol Kerr and weighed 1249 pounds.

Eighteen steers were sold singly, and 16 in pens of two. The total of 32 animals brought \$10,480.

### School Bus Traffic Law Explained

The new school bus law, which was enacted at the last session of the state legislature, has caused some confusion to motorists. The new law states that all motor vehicles must halt travel upon encountering a school bus which is stopped for loading or unloading school children.

In the past, motor vehicles have not been required to stop in these instances, although they were required to slow to a 15-mile speed. Several accidents were caused last year by motorists who failed to yield the right of way to children crossing the street to or from the buses.

Arnold Gralapp, superintendent of city schools stated this morning that several near-accidents were averted when motorists suddenly remembered the new law.

The law affects some 1200 children as well as those persons operating motor vehicles. Last year's school bus population figures listed 701 high school students and 577 grade school children traveling the school buses daily. This year's figures are not yet available but will be similar.

The substance of the new law is that all cars traveling in both directions must stop when meeting a parked school bus which is loading or unloading children. Cars arriving

### Jail Crowded But Holiday 'Quiet' Here

It was a rather quiet holiday week-end for both city and state police here, although a goodly crowd of celebrants were herded off to jail during the three-day period.

Accidents were few and minor. The suburban fire department answered a call to the P. H. Hurley residence, 5083 Lodi, yesterday afternoon and had to call on state police before the blaze was brought under control.

The fire, which started in a garage, was handled without much difficulty but a next-door neighbor, Earl Troy Thomas, 37, hauled out a rifle and ordered firemen off his property as they were working to keep the blaze from spreading.

Fire Chief Buster Gordon called state police, and Thomas was taken off to jail on a disorderly conduct charge.

This morning he paid a \$25 fine assessed in justice court.

Sam Kemp, 21, who was released from the county jail last Wednesday after serving 85 days for drunk driving, landed behind bars again, this time at the city lockup, on a similar charge.

He was arrested Sunday night and this morning fined \$125 and sentenced to 40 days in jail on charges of drunk driving and driving while his operator's license was revoked.

Owner of the car, Garth Orville Parker, 19, of 310 South Fifth, was cited by police for allowing Kemp to drive the automobile.

Michael Jack Zupan, 35, of 429 Commercial forfeited \$75 bail posted on three counts after a minor accident Sunday afternoon. He was chased by a police patrol car from the Fremont bridge to the 1000 block on California before being stopped, and was booked for failure to leave his name and address at the scene of the accident, reckless driving and disorderly conduct.

Robert Fryor, 34, of 4233 Clinton, forfeited \$10 bond put up with city police Saturday night for leaving a minor child locked inside his automobile on North Eighth.

State police arrested Fred Daniel Mitchell, 35, of Algoma last night on a warrant signed by Lawrence D. Buchanan who claimed Mitchell threatened him with a knife. Mitchell was booked at the county jail for disorderly conduct and held in \$500 bail.

Also booked for disorderly conduct was John Patrick Angland, 31, Merrill transient camp, arrested on the complaint of Genevieve B. Tucker early this morning. The woman told state police Angland struck her and took her billfold and car keys.

At the city station over the week-end arrests totaled 41, of them 35 for intoxication.

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### Senator Drops Air Junkets Investigation

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (AP) Senator Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) today dropped his demand on Secretary of Defense Johnson for information about the use of military aircraft by President Truman and other top government officials.

Thomas told reporters he was dropping it because Undersecretary of Defense Stephen Early had assured him that use of military aircraft will be restricted in the future to "public business."

Thomas added that he now considers a "closed matter" the controversy stirred up by Johnson's objections to a request from a group of senators for a military plane to fly them part way around the world.

In a sharp retort Saturday, Thomas demanded that Johnson give him detailed data on the cost of government aircraft used by President Truman, Vice President Barkley and other government officials, including Johnson himself.

It was learned that Senate Democratic Leader Lucas of Illinois brought Early to see Thomas yesterday. They talked things over and the ruckus was smoothed out.
