Survey Says \$20 Billion For Highways

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (AP)—The United States needs at least \$20,000,000,000 worth of highway construction.

That was reported yesterday by Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), who has just finished a survey to determine the nation's current road building and repair needs. Of 40 states responding to inquiries, he said, the reports received from 34 indicate an accumulation of highway deficiencies which would require an expenditure of more than \$20,000,000,000 to correct.

O'Mahoney, chairman of the joint congressional committee on the economic report, said the backlog

"will afford an unmeasured market for business and industry." He added that the information is being turned over to the bureau of public roads.
