Jordan, Carr Hurl Wins For Numbers 19, 20

Gems, Diamonds' Pitchers Finish On Top Of Heap

Southpaw Niles Jordan of the Gems shot at 20 games last night and hit the target dead center, but Bill Carr of Pittsburg did the same thing.

Both were hoping to become the only 20-game winners in the Far West baseball league this season and both needed two wins yesterday to make it. Here at Gems stadium Jordan pitched his team to a 10-2 win over the Marysville Braves in the first game of a doubleheader and elected to work the second game also. He came off with an even better-pitched 9-3 win.

Carr, a righthander, won his 19th game by blanking Willows 7-0 on one hit, then set the Redbirds down with only seven hits for a 10-4 nightcap victory and his big No. 20.

All yesterday's season-closing games were held to seven innings. Jordan and Carr, destined to go up next season, finished with 20-7 and 20-8 won-lost records respectively. The league high mark for pitchers, set last year by Medford Manager Larry Shepard, is 22-3.

Medford yesterday topped Redding in both ends of a twin bill 8-4 and 10-9 with George Pain and John McMillan going the route to win each game.

TITLE TO PITT
As was in the bag already, Pittsburg won the Far West league championship, finishing four and a half games ahead of the Gems. Willows came in third and Redding fourth. The league's Shaughnessy playoff starts Wednesday and in the first round Pittsburg plays Willows and Klamath Falls takes on Redding. The first round is three out of five.

Saturday's scores all around the league were: Klamath 9, Redding 8; Marysville 12, Medford 4; Willows 5, Pittsburg 6.

Although Jordan's pitching was the big noise yesterday, the Gems got plenty of boom from their bats. In the first game Pinky Hesse and Ken Jensen each homered and in the nightcap Jack Buick slammed out his first professional ball home run. Lee Kast hit for four bases for Marysville in the latter game.

Jordan allowed six hits in the opener, four in the nightcap and in the latter defeated Pete Swain. Marysville's top pitcher who was looking for his 19th victory, Pinky Hesse swiped his 40th base in the nightcap to capture league honors in that respect.

FERRY FANNED
Sunday's game was Marysville all the way. Chuck Schmidmeyer gave up too many walks in the early innings and was the loser. Saturday night saw Stan Gilson get an assist from Hub Kittle in turning a 9-8 victory over Redding. With the score standing at two out in the ninth frame, Kittle marched in to relieve Gilson on the mound and fanned Ray Perry.

Perry, incidentally, failed to hit any more homers over the weekend and finished with 48, a new league record.

The Gems have an off-the-cuff city game tonight against the semi-pro Klamath Pioneers. At Gems stadium starting at 7:45. The game has been in the making all season. Coos Bay Lad Wins H-N Play

Veteran Ken Karns of Klamath Falls fell to the blasting net shots of Mighty Mite Don Megale of Coos Bay who won the singles championship in the second annual Herald and News open invitational tennis tournament held at Moore park Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

Karns, who won the tourney last year, couldn't cope with the energetic Megale in six-pound Oregon State sophomores. Although canny Karns had his accurate backhand working to perfection in the second set to upend Megale 6-0, the 19-year-old Coos Bay lad won the first set, 6-2, and went on to cop the third and fourth, 6-4, 6-3.

Karns demonstrated his veteran campaigning when he paired with Bill Crawford Monday after losing to Megale and the Karns-Crawford combo drubbed Jerry Olson and Earl Brooks in straight sets, 6-3, 6-0, 6-4 to win the doubles title.

Dorothy Morris of Ashland was the other out-of-town winner. Dorothy trounced Klamath's Ruth Hagelstein, city tournament winner, 6-1, 6-4 in the finals.

Ronnie Lowell, showing marked improvement during the invitational open, turned the tables on Ever Karnes, who beat him in the recent city tourney, to win the junior crown. Final score was 6-1, 6-2, 6-0.

Consolation men's singles winner was George Mills who downed Lowell, who entered both the junior and men's divisions, 6-4, 6-1.

Consolation winners in the men's doubles bracket were Loren Hughes and 15-year-old Bruce Dingler. The finals went the full five sets with Hughes and Dingler outlasting Dr. Raymond Tice and Bud Case, 6-3, 3-6, 4-6, 6-3, 6-2.

Energetic Megale advanced to the Monday finals with wins over Jerry Olson, Bill Crawford and Todd Tibbutt, first-ranking Medford netter.

Karns got the finals shot with easy wins over Bob Logan, George Mills Tice.

Miss Morris had a rather easy time of it. She had to play only the finals match to win. She eased into the finals with two defaults, while Miss Hagelstein had to win over Delores Steele to gain the finals.

Crawford and Karns, who also won the doubles bauble in the city tourney, downed Jim Smith and Max Hicks and then Jim Finnigan and Mills to gain the finals. Olson and Brooks had to get over Hughes and Dingler and Tibbutt and John Richardson to get to Medford.

In the junior division Karns got over Dingler to get a crack at Lowell in the finals. Dingler, one of the local horizon, extended Karns three sets. Lowell bludgeoned John Owens in straight sets to get into the finals and beat Karns for the junior laurels.

Megale was fourth-seeded in the tourney. Karns rated the first spot with Tibbutt second, Tice third, Darrell Walker of Bend, who didn't show up for the tourney, fifth, then Crawford, Richard and Case.

Race Hot In Homestretch Of Coast Loop

Twinks Keep Slim Bulge With Double Win Over Solons

Can Hollywood last in the hot Pacific Coast league race?

The Stars, out in front most of the season, still hold a three game edge over the Oakland Oaks, the 1948 champs. With only 20 games left, the stretch run shapes up as a neck and neck two-team affair.

The Stars face series with San Diego, San Francisco and Seattle. The Oaks' foes are Sacramento, Los Angeles and Portland.

Hollywood looked like it could make it in taking two from Sacramento Labor Day, the passenger's fifth straight win. Willie Ramstedt threw a one-hitter to annex the opener 3-1. The lone poke was a pinch homer by Rookie Bill Wilson. The Stars' hurler had to throw his best ones as the Solons' Orr Grove gave up but three safeties in losing. The game had its dark side, though, as Jim Baxes, the Stars' sensational third baseman, tripped over first base for a possible fractured rib. However, Murray Franklin replaced him in the nightcap and hit a homer and a double. The Stars won 6-3.

The Oaks took the opener 6-2 from San Diego and then sewed up the second game quickly with an eight run first inning. The final score was 9 to 2. Oakland now has a four game win streak. The Oaks' slugger Earl Rapp, hit his thirteenth homer in the first game—a 400 foot blast.

SEALS SPLIT
San Francisco split a double bill with Portland. The Seals scored a ninth inning run to take the opener, 9 to 8 but the Beaver exploded for 15 hits in the seven-inning nightcap to win 11 to 1. Eddie Basinski came out of a long batting slump to lead the Beavers in the nightcap. He bashed out six runs with a double and grand slam homer.

The Seattle Rainiers' two pitching aces, Guy Fletcher and Charlie Schanz, blanked Los Angeles twice 2 to 0 and 3 to 0. Schanz won his 19th on a beautiful one-hit performance in the seven-inning nightcap. Big Guy allowed eight hits but had his troubles with the lowly Angels. Successive home runs in the seventh inning, by Jack Warren and Al Lyons gave Guy his two run margin.

Don Watkins had held the Rainiers to three scattered singles until the double blast. It was the ninth straight win for the red hot Rainiers who are tied with Sacramento for third place, eight games behind Hollywood.

Only one game is on tap for tonight in the loop. San Francisco plays at Portland with Lefty Cliff Melton (4-4), the probable mound choice for the Seals against the Beavers' Dr. Francis Dierick (1-2).

YREKA, Sept. 6 (Special)—The Yreka Indians and Dunsmuir Railroaders will open play next Sunday at Dunsmuir in the final round of the Northern California league's Shaughnessy playoff, two games out of three.

Last Sunday the two clubs gained the finals by wins over Klamath and Hill.

The Indians clubbed Fran Miller and Pat Williams for a 10-0 triumph over the Klamath Pioneers here, taking the lead on a six-run outburst in the second inning. The inning included a homer with the bases loaded by Jack Morgan and another with one aboard by Don True.

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YANKS, CARDINALS HOLD SLIM LEADS

Dodgers Gain On Redbirds

Down the stretch come the New York Yankees and St. Louis Cardinals, clinging desperately to 1 1/2-game leads that tradition says they should hold.

Only five of the last 20 Labor Day leaders have failed to make the world series in the last 10 years, but maybe the runnerup Boston Red Sox and Brooklyn Dodgers don't read the record books.

St. Louis lost a game of its lead to the Dodgers yesterday when they split with Pittsburgh while Brooklyn was thumping Boston twice, 7-2 and 13-2.

Red Munger breezed to his thirteenth win in the Cards' opener as Enos Slaughter drove in five runs in the rout of Murry Dickson, 9-1. The same Munger, trying for the daily double in the second game, lost the decision on relief in the tenth when double by Danny Murtaugh and Stan Rojek gave Pittsburgh a 3-4 edge.

Brooklyn turned the power loose on the weary Braves who now are only one game above the 500 mark. After Joe Hatton was knocked out in the first inning of the morning game, Carl Erskine and Paul Minner contributed 8 2/3 innings of no-hit relief pitching for the edge over Warren Spahn. Preacher Roe tied the National league strikeout high for the year by whiffing 11 in the lopsided second game 13-2.

The starting Phillies extended their win streak to six games by dumping the New York Giants, 9-7 and 4-2. Del Ennis' homer and three singles helped Dutch Meyer best Dave Koslo in the second game after a four-run rally in the ninth gave Ken Heintzelman the nod over reliever Adrian Zabala in the opener.

Cincinnati trimmed Chicago, 7-3, in the first game with a four run knockout blast against Dutch Leonard in the ninth. Johnny Schmitz stopped the Reds in the second, 7-2.

SWEET DOUBLES
All four first division clubs swept doubles in the American, leaving the Yanks' lead safe at 1 1/2 games. New York blasted Philadelphia, 13-4 and 5-2, while the Red Sox ran over Washington 5-2 and 12-2.

Joe DiMaggio's grand slam homer broke open the first game for the Yanks when Vic Raschi came up with his 18th victory over Lou Brubaker.

DiMaggio had to leave the second game because of cramps in both legs after the first inning, but the Yanks put on a four-run spurge in the fourth to win. The game was called by darkness after seven innings.

Mel Parnell earned his 21st win in Boston's 5-2 opening triumph, although nicked for 11 hits. Bobby Doerr's 17th homer off Sid Hudson started the Sox on their way. They cut loose with a 16-hit attack in the second, including Vern Stephens' 36th homer. Walt Masterson, an ex-stripper, silenced his old mates with seven hits.

INDIANS COP FAIR
Cleveland took a pair from Chicago, 3-3 and 6-4. Larry Doby hit a homer in each game and George Metkovich hit two for the White Sox in the second game. And Bob Lemon tossed a four-hitter to cop No. 18 in the finale.

Detroit continued to sizzle, making 14 out of their last 16 by subduing St. Louis twice, 4-0 and 2-1. Neat pitching jobs by Freddie Hutchinson, who spun a four-hit shutout against Al Pappal, and by Art Houtteman who tossed a six hitter, did the trick.

Fleischer Honored For Part Played In Mug-mangling

NEW YORK (NEA)—The Italian Federation of Boxing is to confer the "Italian Order of Knighthood" on Nat Fleischer for his efforts on behalf of international boxing.

"What international boxing?" you may ask, but it's pleasing to see someone excited about the manly art of mangling mugs.

Editor Fleischer of The Ring magazine will be decorated during the European Boxing union convention in Rome September 17-18-19.

He plans quite a trip in search of talent—London, Stockholm, Antwerp, Brussels, Rome, Paris, Barcelona and back to London town in the event that the Lee Savold-Bruce Woodcock match takes place, as tentatively scheduled, September 28.

If he looks hard enough, Fleischer might return with Jersey Joe Walcott. The old Camden fellow is over there somewhere, still celebrating the flattening of Ollie Tandberg, and wondering where he can find some more pleasant work of the kind.

Fleischer, who keeps in close touch with fistie affairs on the other side, doubts that the Savold-Woodcock match will take place this year, and relates how an Englishman's friendness for Lee called off a joust for which Promoter Jack Solomon had sold 46,000 tickets at White City.

Woodcock was driving to his training camp in a jeep when he decided to drop in at his mother's home, which was on the way, for tea and crumpets. He suffered a broken shoulder blade when the jeep skidded into a tree.
