Business Women Serve Community

Klamath Falls business women are perhaps the most organized women in the city, for business women here have four service clubs operating. All are doing projects for the benefit of the city population and most are concentrating on the underprivileged.

The Soroptimist club has for its purpose "the economic advancement of women and aid to minor girls." However, members sponsor other projects such as a one-day drive for the Easter Seal campaign for crippled children. They provide scholarships to worthy high school graduates, and they aid the Girl Scouts and the Camp Fire Girls.

Members of the Soroptimist club are all executives in business. Club president, Mrs. Vincent Lawler, is one of the partners in the secretarial agency here.

Aside from their own activities, the members of the club also sponsor a group for young women in business. This group is the Venture club. The Venture club is an independent group with its own service projects. The club is under the leadership of Lena Parsons who is connected with a market here.

The Venture club's purpose is "doing for others." The members donate toward various funds, give aid to families in need of help after a disaster such as a fire. For some time the club has been giving children's books and magazines to the juvenile cottage.

The Business and Professional Women's club is open to women active in the business world. This year's president is Mrs. Hugh Hawthorne, who owns a tailor shop here.

The club has been sponsoring a dental program for underprivileged children. It also gives a \$100 scholarship for college every year for a high school girl graduate who is interested in a career.

They contributed last year to the student loan fund at Oregon Technical Institute and to the Lilly Daryl music fund. Another project is that of giving Christmas boxes to needy families. The group also

aims in any civic program in which it is needed.

At present the club is helping organize a point BPW club for Tulelake, Malin and Merrill.

The Quota club is an organization of executive women in business also. Club president is Joy Rolph, who is affiliated with the Klamath Medical Service bureau.

The main projects of the club are to help school children who have defective hearing and to aid juvenile girls. Help is given to needy children after the hearing tests are made at the schools during the fall.

Hearing aids are also given to older people who are in need and are unable to finance them.

In their aid to juveniles and club members have organized a recreation room at the juvenile cottage, and the club this past year gave two campships to Camp Fire Girls and made a gift to the Girl Scouts.
