

Wheat Sales In Orient, Oregon Goal

HALEM, Sept. 8 (AP)—The Oregon wheat commission's proposal to study the Oriental market for north-west wheat has been accepted by the U. S. department of agriculture, the commission announced at its closing session here yesterday.

E. J. Bell, commission administrator, said a marketing expert and another specialist probably will be sent to Japan, India, the Philippines and other regions of the Far East.

Richard Baum, wheat marketing analyst for the commission, was ordered to go east to get information on markets for wheat in manufacture of starch, glucose, alcohol, glutamic acid, food flavoring and other products. He will confer with federal agriculture officials and with manufacturers. He will report to the commission in December.

Doctors Examining Unruh, New Jersey's Mass Killer

CAMDEN, N. J., Sept. 8 (AP)—Howard B. Unruh, the Bible-reading gun collector who slaughtered 13 persons in a pre-conceived murder plot, began today a series of mental tests that may last two months.

That was reported today by doctors at the New Jersey state hospital for the insane at Trenton. Unruh is held there under 24-hour guard in solitary confinement.

The 36-year-old hollow-cheeked killer—a former army artilleryman—was taken to the hospital yesterday. Four psychiatrists who had examined him in Camden's Cooper hospital recommended more mental tests, and Unruh agreed to go.

Camden Prosecutor Mitchell Cohen insisted Unruh "has not been declared insane," is only under observation.

"That's the fairest thing to do for all concerned," Cohen said, "though I would have liked to arraign him at once for murder."

Detectives disclosed that Unruh, while a patient at Cooper hospital, was threatened by a relative of 10-year-old John H. Wilson—whose death yesterday raised the toll in Tuesday's River road massacre to 13—who appeared at his room. Unruh was under treatment for a bullet wound of the hip.

The Wilson boy's relative, detectives said, declared "I'm going to get him." The man—whose identity was not disclosed—was restrained and led away.

65 Fires On Fremont This Year

Sixty-five fires have occurred on the Fremont national forest to September 1 this year as compared to 49 for the same period last year, according to Carroll Brown, assistant supervisor. Nineteen of these fires have been man-caused while 47 have been caused by lightning. Smoker fires still lead the man-caused list with 12 fires starting from this cause.

The last general rain occurred in the Fremont area between May 29 and 25 although a light shower occurred in early July. Forest fuels are dry, vegetation is dead, making burning conditions more critical this year than for the past 10 years.

Foresters are asking those who use the woods to use extreme caution by putting out their smoking material before throwing it away; by extinguishing any fire they discover, and by reporting fires immediately to the ranger stations at Bly, Paisley, Silver Lake or other forest offices.

The two closures, Summer Lake rim, and the Lakeview Logging company area, are again in effect this year. Anyone desiring to use these areas must first obtain an entry permit at the Paisley ranger station, at the Warner district office in the Lakeview post office building or from any forest officer.
