SALEM, Sept. 8 (AP)—Attendance at the Oregon state fair is running slightly ahead of last year's record crowd.

The total for the first three days of this fair is 141,883, compared with 138,722 in the first three days of last year.

Attendance at yesterday's Salem Day program was 37,880, which was 4000 less than on the same day last year.

A good crowd was expected today as the army, navy and marines took over with special events.

Bugs In Food 'Often Very Nourishing'

BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 8 (AP)—Don't worry about bugs you may eat in fruit or salads. They're often very nourishing, E. O. Essig, University of California entomologist, said today.

Men have eaten insects for food for thousands of years. Essig said examples are locusts, water bugs in tropical Asia and white caterpillars in Mexico City. Insects add carbohydrates, fats, protein and nitrogen to your diet but aren't reliable as a source of vitamins.

\$600,000 Plant Fire In Beloit

BELOIT, Wis., Sept. 8 (AP)—Fire swept through the main plant of an ice cream manufacturing plant late last night, causing damage estimated by a company official at \$600,000.

The two-story brick structure housing the Taylor Freezer corporation near the downtown district was completely destroyed. Firemen fought the blaze for more than two hours before getting it under control shortly after midnight.

T. A. Strayer, a company official who estimated the damage, said only company records were saved. Fire Chief Glenn Davis said damage might "run as high" as \$200,000 and "possibly as high as \$500,000." Strayer said the fire broke out at 10 p.m. when an automatic gas water heater exploded in the assembly department.
