

Tulelake Lindseys Making European Friendship Tour

TULELAKE, Sept. 6—Europe-bound Gus Lindsey and his daughter Virginia, the travelers left by plane Sunday afternoon for New York where they will join a group from many parts of the United States which will tour Europe on the widely publicized Farmer's Friendship tour.

The party will sail on the Ile de France September 7 and will land at Le Havre, France, September 12. The itinerary will take them to Paris, Brussels, Amsterdam where they will see the world famous flower auction, to Copenhagen by air, Oslo, Bergen and back to New York and London. They will return to New York from London by air, arriving October 6.

The trip, a goodwill jaunt, is being taken to cement friendships between farmers in this country and in Europe and is being taken principally by farmers who have been

active in farm organizations. Mr. Lindsey, a 1932 homesteader was long active with the Modoc county triple A and the farm bureau and notification that he was eligible for the tour came through the California Farm Federation. His ranch is located three miles east of town on the East-West road. Tulelake elementary school faculty, has a leave of absence and will resume her work upon her return. Pear Storage To Begin In Next 30 Days

Storage of Rogue River valley pears here is hitting its stride with a total of about 300 cars expected to be stored at Tulelake Cold Storage and Klamath Ice and Storage during the season.

Estimates of total storage in this area set the number at just about average compared to previous years. Bartlett are being stored in quantity just now and will probably move out within the next 30 days to meet demands of eastern markets.

D'Anjou pears are a later variety, as are both Comice and Bosc. The latter two types are in particular demand for the holiday season and stored here in transit, moving on to eastern markets as the demand increases.

TRAFFIC DEATHS

Oregon traffic deaths numbered thirty-nine last month, the highest monthly death toll recorded so far this year. Secretary of State Earl T. Newbury said the August toll brings 1949 traffic deaths to one hundred eighty-eight. This is eighty-four less than the number killed at the same time last year. Most of the August death crashes took place on open highways, with loss of control at high speed the chief contributing factor, Newbury said.

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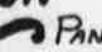
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
