

Third World War Seeds Said Sown

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 9 (AP) — The peace terms of World War II, even though the treaties have not been signed, already have sown the seeds of another world war, the American Bar association was told yesterday.

The speaker was one of the judges at the Nuremberg war crimes trials, Robert F. Maguire, a Portland, Ore., attorney.

"The Yalta, Moscow and Potsdam conferences already have done untold damage," Maguire declared. "Much of Europe now writhes under unjust discriminations, seizures of land and power at the expense of the helpless."

"Until these are removed, there can be no lasting peace," he asserted.

Provisions of the treaty of Versailles after World War I gave rise to the resentment and discontent which made the ground fertile for Hitler to plant his doctrine of authoritarian government," the speaker said.

But despite that clear warning, he declared, "Allied statesmen (in World War II) proceeded to make the same mistakes and sow the same seeds from which the same rank crop will necessarily arise."

The house of delegates of the association adopted a compromise measure after debating heatedly for three hours whether the association should recommend ratification by the U. S. senate of the United Nations proposal to outlaw genocide—the mass extermination of peoples.

In the compromise resolution the delegates opposed ratification of the proposal as submitted, but went on record as abhorring genocide. The convention ended yesterday.

Psychology Termed Aid To US Free Enterprise

DENVER, Sept. 9 (AP)—A psychological aid to save America's free enterprise was described to the American Psychological association yesterday. It was proposed by Dr. Douglas McGregor, president of the Antioch college, Ohio.

"If," he said, "another major depression forces the overthrow of America's free enterprise system, one of the principal reasons will be acute problems of human relations confronting industry."

From the psychological point of view he said the great risk is failure of many managements to realize the workers' needs. These needs, he explained, are not only for food, shelter and clothing. They are also for power, prestige and achievement. The latter three, he said, are too often overlooked. Psychology would take them into account and make them part of free enterprise.

Psychology would also adopt a new point of view in relations between management and workers. This is a modified continuation of the relation between parents and children. An industrial parent would be a family in which everyone grows through the group for his own interests.

"There are managers" Dr. Mc-

Gregor explained "who believe they can make people work by being fair but firm. This is a compromise between the philosophy of the whip and that of the bribe."

"We have plenty of psychological evidence that such a conception is unsound. If one expects to continue a relationship with people it is not worth while to try to make them do anything. Apathy or hostility are virtually inevitable consequences of the manager who seeks to make people do his bidding."

Aerial War On Budworm Is Planned

PORTLAND, Sept. 9 (AP)—Aerial war plans against the spruce budworm were in the making today. Eastern Oregon seemed certain to be the principal battleground next year.

Foresters met here to draw up plans for 1950 spraying of infested areas. They said 2,332,350 acres already have been infested with \$65,000 in drastic need of spraying.

The timber involved is worth \$32,980,000, they estimated. Most of the infestation is in Oregon.

Speakers said the budworm, besides destroying timber, is a fire hazard and threatens the water reserves of Pendleton, Walla Walla, Baker, Milton-Freewater and other Blue mountain communities.

A committee was named to select the areas to be sprayed first and to make financing plans. E. L. Kolbe, chief forester of the Western Pine association, was named chairman. The final plan is not expected until next month.

Wife, Child Race Time To Join Husband in US

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 9 (AP)—Transportation workers in four countries are racing against time in an effort to reunite an American war veteran and his German wife and child.

The veteran, Edward Reibeck, 27, of Portland, Ore., is nervously waiting here, hoping his family will arrive in the United States by mid-night September 21—the deadline war brides must make to enter the country without going through quota procedures. And Reibeck says, "they tell me it would take five years to bring them in under quota."

Reibeck married while serving in the army of occupation in Germany. He came to this country to prepare a home. Meanwhile his child, Beatrice Marianne, 2, whom he has never seen, was born.

Reibeck said he made reservations for his wife and baby with a steamship company in Chicago. But when he went there to check on the reservations later, he was told the company could not bring them over for months.

In desperation he came to New Orleans, but steamship lines here told him the same story.

He had a rebate on the fare he had paid the Chicago steamship office and thought maybe he could arrange air transportation. But that, range air transportation. But that, range air transportation. But that, range air transportation.

Newspaper stories of his plight brought results, however. Two persons, asking that their names not be

used, offered to help him financially. One found him a job here.

And a travel agency with offices here went all out in an attempt to arrange transportation for the mother and child. It is working with agencies in Germany, England, Canada and the United States.

Present plans call for them to sail from Southampton, England, Sept. 13 aboard the SS Aquitania and arrive in Canada September 19.

But there is still the problem of getting them from Frankfurt, Germany to Bremerhaven and from there to Southampton.

Girl Killed In Landslide

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Sept. 9 (AP)—A landslide crashed down on a house in the logging town of Deed yesterday, killing an 18-year-old girl.

Her 22-year-old sister-in-law escaped only by a freak. A refrigerator tumbled next to her and kept her from being crushed as the smashed house was carried 100 feet to the east fork of the Hood river.

Suffocated under the slide was Al-ta Joanne Downard, who was helping Mrs. Reese Howell in the kitchen at the time. Mrs. Howell, an

expectant mother, was only partly covered by dirt, and was dug free 20 minutes later.

Her small daughter also was spared, as she was playing in the untouched yard of a neighbor.

The dirt and rocks tumbled down, on the town, ten miles south of here, from a steep hillside. James D. Wierick, general manager of the Oregon Lumber company, estimated 400 cubic yards slipped free. He blamed moisture from an irrigation canal at the base of the hill.

The slide covered the Lost Lake highway in its course toward the Howell home, which was the only one hit.

Mrs. Howell was hospitalized, here, apparently in good condition. Miss Downard's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Alma O. Downard, Sunnyvale, Calif.

- 4—Unity of PREACHING because there is ONE FAITH.
- 5—Unity of ORGANIZATION because there is ONE BODY.
- 6—Unity of LIFE because there is ONE SPIRIT.
- 7—Unity of PURPOSE because there is ONE HOPE.

This blessed passage from God's Word contains every essential for Christian Unity.
