Germany's fresh attempt to establish a democracy is under way in the four old university towns of Bonn on the Rhine, where her new parliament is holding its first sessions.

It is a heroic effort, surrounded by appalling difficulties. Germany is only the shadow of her former self, the victim of her own misdeeds. The country is physically divided, for only the western areas occupied by American, French military forces are included in the government.

That is the material with which the young parliament has to start work. And in large degree it is an adventure into strange surroundings. For Germany's experience with democracy in the accepted sense of the term, has been meagre.

Of course that contingency will be taken care of so long as the allies keep a military check on the country. But lasting peace can come only with the establishment of real democracy and international brotherhood.

There is no reason, as I see it, to doubt that it is possible to achieve success. The Germans as a whole are not a warlike folk. On the contrary they are industrious, home-loving people who want peace. Their weakness in the past is seen that they were susceptible to regimentation and were victimized by the Prussian warlords.

Swissman's Spirit This pact, signed at Locarno, Switzerland, on October 16, 1925, during the time of the Weimar republic, pledged Germany, Belgium, France, Britain and Italy mutually to guarantee the peace in Western Europe.
