QUESTION: Recently some friends and neighbors of ours had a serious fire. When the firemen had put out the fire, our friends wanted to go into the least damaged part of the house to remove some furniture and other possessions to their garage, which had not burned. However, some other neighbors told them that if they moved anything, the insurance company might not pay for their loss. Could you tell me if this is correct?

ANSWER: Far from it! Actually your friends not only had a perfect right to move their possessions to a safe place—it was their duty to do so. People who suffer a fire loss are obligated to do everything possible to prevent further damage or loss to undamaged or partially damaged property.

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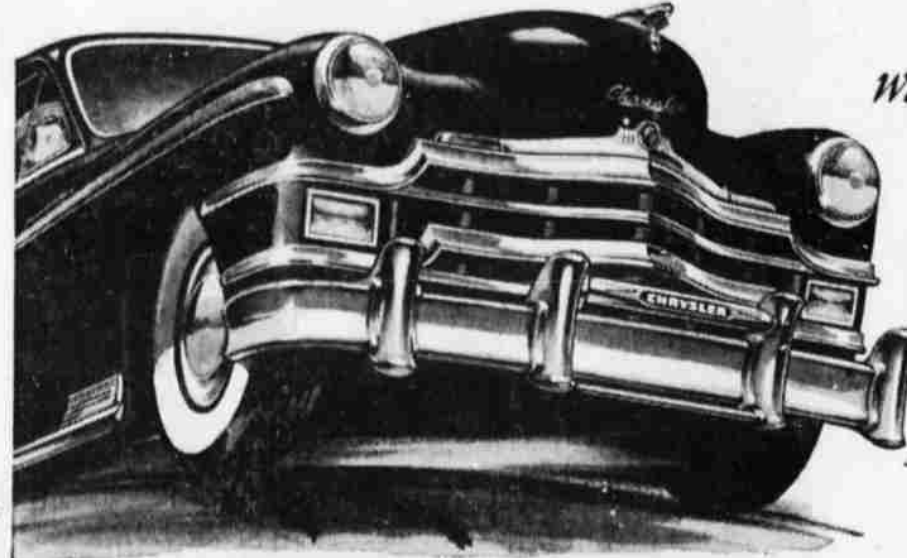
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
