GRAIN PRICES UNSTEADY

CHICAGO, Sept. 12 (AP)—Grain and soybean prices dipped, climbed and then fell again today on the board of trade.

Soybeans fluctuated most, dropped more than a cent early, then rallying about 2 cents above the previous close, then falling below the previous levels again. Weakness in cotton seed oil future, and the same bearish factors as depressed prices Saturday, led to selling today.

Wheat and corn were mixed most of the time, although occasional rallies pushed prices higher. The distant July contract fell below the previous seasonal low mark of \$1.84. Large country receipts of 269 cars of corn was a depressing influence in that grain.

Grains rallied again near the close at or near the best levels of the day.

Wheat close 1/4 to 1/2 higher than the previous finish, September \$2.06 1/4; corn was up 1/4 to 1/2, September \$1.26 1/4; oats were unchanged to 1/4 higher, September 60; rye was up 1/4 to 1/2, September \$1.45; soybeans were 1/4 to 1/2 higher, November \$2.29 1/2-2.29 3/4, and last was 7 to 20 cents higher, September \$12.10 per hundred pounds.

CHICAGO, Sept. 12 (AP)—Beef steers and heifers jumped to new high price levels for the last eight months today and hogs sold mostly 50 cents a hundred pounds higher than Friday in an active market.

A load of choice to prime steers sold at \$33.10, the highest since January 18 when \$33.25 was paid, and several high-choice loads took \$32.50 to \$32.75. Choice heifers reached \$29.65, the most paid for this class since January 5 when the peak for these was \$30.00. Steer and heifer trade in general was 50 cents to \$1.00 higher than Friday and some sales were up \$1.25 to \$1.50.

Choice butcher hogs reached \$22.75, their highest price in exactly one month.

DALLAS, Sept. 12 (AP)—A steam-fitter who charged his own union with "unfair and discriminatory practices" against its members is picketing the union's headquarters again today.

Ray Booker has said he will picket local headquarters of the AFL Plumbers and steamfitters union each Monday until the union "stops its boycott of members who want to do a full day's work."

Booker charges the union "is interested in stretching out construction jobs as long as possible, and to do so instructs its members to work at a certain pace to insure that jobs last as long as possible. Union officials have offered no comment."

'Enterprise' To Be Left Aground
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12 (AP) The British motorship Enterprise will be left to the mercy of the wind and sea where it ran aground off Point Arena, 100 miles north of here.

All hope to salvage the abandoned vessel was given up yesterday. Her holds, containing one million dollars worth of Canadian wheat, were flooded. The vessel ran aground early Friday in a fog.

To add insult to injury the battery in the car was run down and no service station in town could re-charge it—no electricity. Dinner was, of necessity, a cold one, with uncooked vegetables replacing the baked stuffed peppers I had planned.

The one local restaurant which was able to stay open, because they cooked with gas, was jammed, and closed its doors at 8:30 when the food supply was exhausted.

Water Threat
For a time it was feared the water supply would be exhausted, for the pump on the 50,000 gallon water tank is powered by electricity. Luckily this threat failed to materialize.

Phone Trouble
Local telephone operators had their troubles too, for they were forced to use battery equipment, and ring all numbers by hand. Until Friday morning, Merrill was without telephone communication with Klamath Falls as some 17 or 18 poles were out between the two towns.

Thank goodness, a power failure for such a length of time is rare indeed, and only goes to prove how much modern day living is dependent on a commodity which we take so much for granted until we are deprived of it.
