Female Five Percenter's 'Lobby' Game Cleaning Up

WASHINGTON (NEA)—A smart capital socialite has capitalized on the troubles of Washington's five per centers and now is reaping a fat five per cent profit for herself.

The society lady with a shrewd eye for business is Mrs. Douglas L. Hatch, wife of a prominent Washington attorney. Her product is a new game called "Lobby." And since the influence sellers have been in the headlines, her game has been sweeping the country faster than the "monopoly" craze of the '30s.

It's similar to parcheesi. Any number of persons can play. Each contestant thinks up some bill he would like to have passed by congress. He throws dice to proceed along the various places on the board, which represent the various steps a bill must take going through congress and the White House.

All the pitfalls which a real bill faces are on the board. A contestant's measure can get lost in a committee, pressure groups can oppose it, parliamentary maneuvering can tie it up and the president can veto it.

At various stages the player has to make speeches defending his bill, appear before committees and answer questions about it and he has to debate his measure on a mythical floor of congress. First person to make a bill law wins.

If you know something about the federal law-making process, you can rig up your own board. That's

at trying to lick the tortuous legislative process.

Unofficial local clump is Sen. Karl Mundt from South Dakota, a prominent member of the committee investigating the five per centers. He is reported to have licked some of the town's top lobbyists at their own game.

When the five per cent probe hit the papers, Mrs. Hatch figured it might be a good idea to try to market her game, with public interest focused on Washington's influence wielders and peddlers.
