

Indian Boys Taken After Store Thefts

Approximately \$1600 worth of merchandise was taken from Leroy Glenderson's store in Chiloquin early Tuesday morning by five young Indians who planned to hide up all winter somewhere on the Klamath reservation.

Their plans went slightly awry and all are held in the county jail and will be turned over to the federal government for prosecution.

The loot from the store included 10 new firearms, ammunition, clothing, hams, eggs, butter, two radios. Most has been recovered but the radios were broken up and some of the ammunition fired.

Nabbed By Police

The boys, two of them 18, two 15 and one 14 years old, were captured Tuesday when Chiloquin Police Chief Archie Huff, Juvenile Officer Howard Strode and a state police officer located them on a hillside near Chiloquin.

After the boys were spotted, Strode kept their attention while the other two men came up from behind close enough, they said, to hear the youths threaten to shoot "the first cop" they saw.

Two of the young Indians were armed with rifles when captured. They had been located by the sound of rifle fire when they stopped to do a little target shooting with the newly-stolen firearms.

Several Traps

An inventory of the articles stolen from the store and recovered set the amount of the lot at over \$1600. Apparently the boys made several trips to the store to carry out their loot, officers said.

Ben Mitchell and Harold Hill, both 18, are reported to have passed from a federal reformatory and the three younger boys have juvenile records, police said.

India's Social Demos Organize As Party

NEW DELHI (AP)—Free India's first parliamentary opposition was formed here recently under the name of the social democratic party. It consists of one socialist leader, three congressmen who recently resigned from the party, and five former Muslim league members. K. T. Shah, Bombay professor of economics, is leader of the new party.

The party spokesman claimed that it has 20 spokesmen in a house of about 300. It is scheduled to function when the constituent assembly meets on November 21 to do parliamentary work.

The party's aims are reported to be: Progressive nationalization of all key industries, public utilities and social services; free and universal compulsory basic education up to 14 years of age; free and universal health services; maintenance of all civil liberties; securing decent standard of living and civilized conditions of work and amenities of life to every industrial and agricultural laborer; adult franchise and direct election; decentralization of all power; full support to all efforts for world peace.

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Mexico would be glad to trade more goods with Italy. She might even take small complete industries from Italy, machinery, materials and workers with the know-how. One of these

barter deals — Mexican sugar for Italian rayon yarn — has been successfully concluded. It was for a value of "several million dollars." Both sides were satisfied but the deal will not be renewed. Mexico now produces all the rayon she needs and Italy has found a cheaper place to buy sugar.

Barter deals are not as easy to arrange as they seem. Two countries must first find products they can export and which the other needs. Then they have to agree on the value of these goods for trading purposes.

Negro College Has Nutrition Project

NASHVILLE (AP)—A nutrition research project has been approved to be carried out at Tennessee Agricultural and Industrial College here on funds allotted under the research and marketing act.

It is the first such project to be approved for a Negro college. Approval is a direct outgrowth of work by Dr. J. R. Otis, Alabama colored extension leader, who was appointed last year by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan to survey research personnel and facilities of Negro colleges and to determine how they

might be utilized under the RMA. Selected Negro children will be studied in this project, which is part of a nationwide program to determine the nutritional status and food intake of various population groups.
