

KF, Grant Open Season Tonight

Aerial Contest Expected

Bob Hendershott's Pelicans will try to fulfill the role of the giant-killer tonight at 8 on Modoc field and Klamath Union high school supporters think they're capable of doing so.

There seems to be little doubt that a spunky Pelican squad, light but possessing the best psychological attitude in years of footballing, will be the underdog when they take the field against a heavier and more experienced team. The Generals are labored by Portland football-wise as the "team to beat" in the Rose City loop.

Since the modern Oregon High School Activities association was formed six years ago, the Grants have topped the state crown three times; in fact, they're the only Portland team that has accomplished this feat.

And when Headman Ted Ogdahl states boldly the Generals are "on the upgrade," sport fans are given an inkling of the type of trouble the Pelicans will be in for tonight.

The Generals will start a forward wall averaging 179 pounds, compared to 171 for the Red and White. However, the story is told more clearly in the backfield where Grant has a weight average of 175 pounds, stacked along only 136 average for the Pelicans.

Only regular of the 1948 Grant backfield not returning this year is Ed Jarman, quarterback, but he'll not be sorely missed. In his place is George Shaw, fourth of the famed Shaw brothers of Grant. George is touted as a better passer than his brother Tom, now a Stanford university candidate for backfield duty.

BIGGEST BACKFIELDER
Heaviest man in the backfield is 190-pound Al Hansen, who thrives on rugged play and track experience has given him speed at the fullback post. Halfbacks are Dale Duff carrying 180 pounds, and Duane Siebert, leading scorer for the Generals last year.

Grant also boasts a veteran line, lightest of whom is 165-pound Stan Hays at one end position. Len Berrie works at right end, tackles are Dean Pochert and Rube Menashe; guards are Bill Webster and Hal Margreaves and the center spot is filled by Fred Paul.

The Pelicans have lost their share of games by the valuable point-after-tally and Bob Hendershott may whisk in Bill Toole for this chore. Last year Grant won over Klamath, 12 to 12.

Only injury on the Pel squad this week was End Dorin Van Lue who suffered a minor wrenched knee but Hendershott says he'll be ready for action.

Grid fans are promised an aerial show tonight. Both teams have strong lines and will probably take to the air to get "up and over."

"TOSS-UP"
Hendershott calls the game a "toss-up" and is waiting to see how his light, but scrappy, backfield units will work.

Bob McPherson will start at quarterback. Bob's main forte is a natural ability to call right plays and he'll also be dangerous in the passing department with Toole.

Big Joe Demetrakon, heaviest man in the Pel backfield at 175 pounds, will probably get the majority of calls for line thrusts.

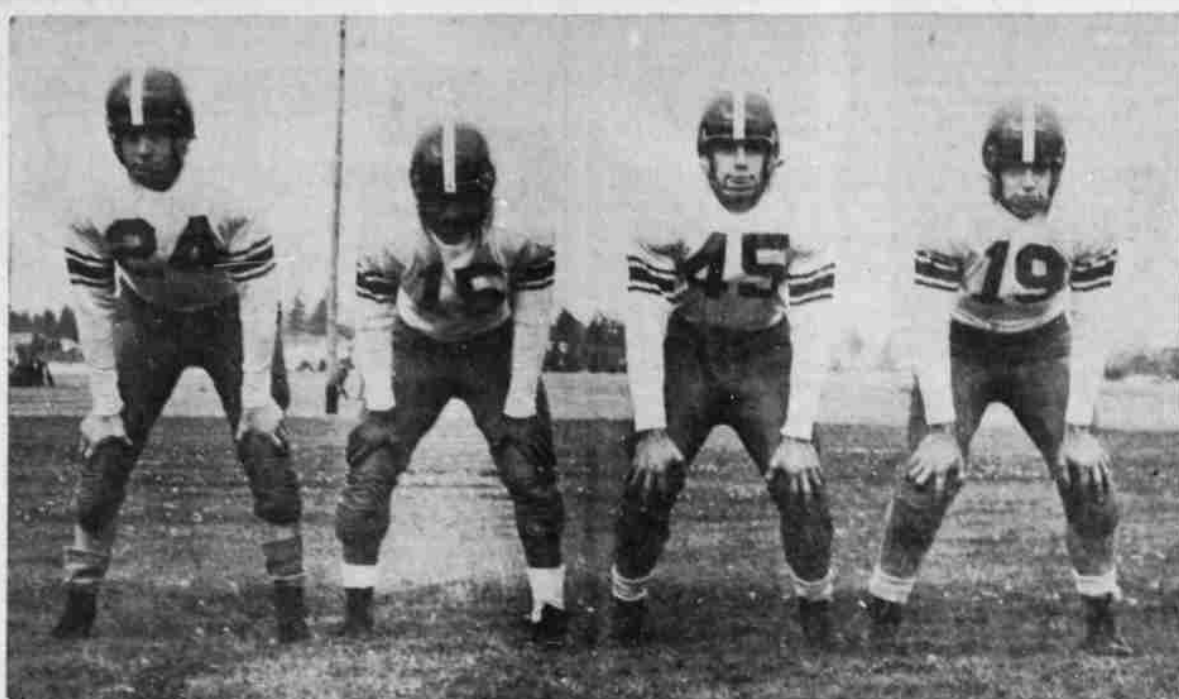
The Pelicans will attempt to spring loose Gaynor Huck, diminutive halfback. Gaynor tips the scales at 135 but runs with knees high and has a smooth change of pace that will no doubt worry the Grant defense.

The other halfback is Gene Carlson, with not too much experience, but a willing, hard-running back.

Van Lue and Tom Schubert will get the opening nod at the Pel end posts. Large Don Allen, 190 pounds, and John White, who loves rough action, are paired at tackles.

The center of the Pelican line is the source of major glee to the KUHS coaching staff. Veterans Dick Petzoldt and Roy Lundgren gap the guard spots while Keith Donahoe has been switched to center.

Grant fans admit that the General reserve strength is "only fair." The two elevens will aim to break a deadlock tonight. In nine past
