WHEAT FUTURES FIRM TODAY

CHICAGO, Sept. 17 (AP)—Wheat futures were firm today on scattered buying after a weak start. Other grains were firm with wheat, while soybeans advanced more than a cent a bushel most of the time.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1/4 higher than the previous finish, September \$2.11 1/4. Corn was unchanged to 1/4 up, September \$1.27-1.27 1/4. Oats were unchanged to 1/4 higher, September 68 1/2. Rye was 1/4 to 1/2 up, September \$1.46 1/2. Soybeans were 1/4 to 1/2 higher, November \$2.31. Lard was 3 to 7 cents a hundred pounds higher, September \$12.10.

LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO, Sept. 17 (AP)—Livestock was quoted normally steady today. The bulk of the hog sales were \$18.75 to \$21.50 nominal. The nominal top was \$21.75.

Hogs reached the season's highest levels Monday and then declined sharply and are 50 cents to \$1.00 lower compared with a week ago. Sows were \$9 to \$9.50 higher, however. The week's top was \$22.75 Monday.

Cattle receipts this week were the largest in more than two years. Excessively all classes and grades of slaughter cattle advanced sharply until Thursday, when the market broke 50 cents to \$2.00 on slaughter steers and heifers. Late trade, however, was unevenly steady to \$2.00 higher than a week ago. The steer top for the week was \$33.15, a new high for the year.

Slaughter lambs were \$1.00 lower compared with a week ago. The early top was \$24.75. The late top was \$24.00.

Here's How Russ Writer Pictures US

BUCHAREST, Romania, Sept. 17 (AP)—America is a land of gum-chewing and sex in automobiles, where the B-36 bomber is the dove of peace and the atom bomb is the olive branch, Ilya Ehrenburg, Russian publicist and novelist, said today.

Writing in The Cominform Journal, Ehrenburg, who has made several trips to the United States, gave this picture of life there:

"Vulgarity and arrogance, robots and chewing gum, sex in an automobile, a Negro soaked in gasoline, supermen who crush skulls, frame-up of communists, hypocrisy and savagery, greed, falsehood and fear. They have a dove of peace—the B-36—and the olive branch—the atom bomb."

"I don't know of any other country in the world where individuality is so crushed and obliterated as in the United States."

PORTLAND, Sept. 17 (AP)—H. H. Sichel, men's clothing store proprietor, told police a pair of teen-age boys took a shot at him with an air pistol when he jolted their dignity by refusing to yield to a "hands up" demand Thursday night.

He said he was approaching his home in the city's northwest district when two boys, about 15 years old, ordered him to put his hands up. One had a weapon that looked like a .45 caliber automatic pistol. Sichel said he grabbed the unarmed boy, shoved him against the other, and continued on his way.
