

### Judge Recall Move Hot In Malheur

ONTARIO, Ore., Sept. 17 (AP)—Malheur county was splitting today into union and anti-union factions, as the battle over the proposed recall of County Judge Irwin Troxell gathered momentum.

Striking road crew workers were circulating petitions asking an election to recall the county judge. The preliminary recall petition was filed by Earl Allen, a Vale farmer who charged that the judge knew nothing of labor relations.

"This situation is more serious than most people think," said the judge. "If the recall carries, the whole county may be expected to go union."

The road workers, who unionized and struck after their wages were cut by the county court, have been replaced on the crew.

### Child-Morals Case Decision Due Monday

A decision will be reached Monday whether to bind over for grand jury action Raymond Johnson, 37, named in two morals cases involving eight-year-old girls.

Justice of the Peace J. A. Mahoney conducted preliminary hearings Thursday and Friday and reserved decision until Monday. Meanwhile, Johnson is free on \$5000 bail.

He is accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor in both charges.

During yesterday afternoon's hearing one of the little girls was the sole witness called to the stand. She testified Johnson made advances toward her and her little companion on the porch of his house and later on the canal bank near far from their residences.

Attorneys E. E. Driscoll and Clarence Humble, representing Johnson, indicated little of their defense plan other than establishing through cross-examination that the incidents related allegedly occurred in the early darkness.

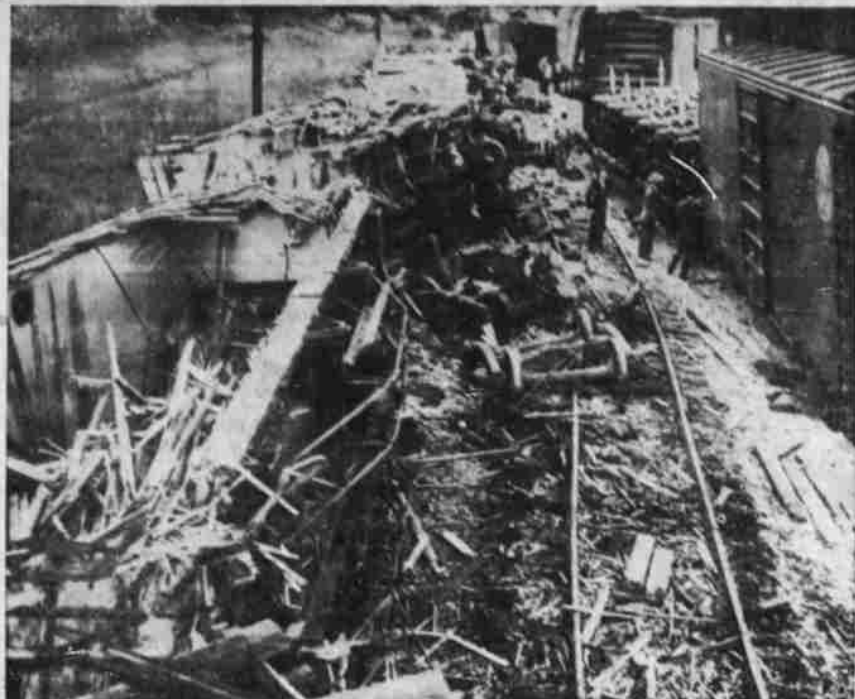

### Pilot Hits Silk At 600 MPH

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—A navy pilot flipped himself out of a plane doing more than 600 miles an hour last month and parachuted safely to earth. Officials think he was the first man to do it at that speed.

On August 9, Lt. Jack L. Fruin was flying his twin-jet Banshee fighter at 40,000 feet near Cherry Point, N. C., when it went into a swift spiral dive. Fruin blew himself clear of the plane by using a pilot ejector seat.

The young pilot suffered a simple leg fracture, which has now healed.

### Safe Robbed In Lakeview

LAKEVIEW, Sept. 17—Between \$400 and \$500 was taken from the safe of the Adams and Pofsum lumber retail store in Lakeview early this morning.

The robbery took place between midnight and 7 a. m., officers said. Sheriff Tom Elliott and State Police Officer Todd Knapp were investigating today. It had not been determined early this morning how entry to the building was gained.

The store, owned by Robert Adams Jr. and Don Pofsum serves as a lumber retail outlet and deals in household furnishings and appliances.

### FISH FROM JAPS

TOKYO, Sept. 17 (AP)—Before long Japanese fishermen will be supplying most of the fish eaten by allied occupation forces. H. C. Harrington, chief of General MacArthur's fisheries division, said the fish will be bought locally in about a month under a new U. S. army policy.

### Rejected Suitor Hangs Self

BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 17 (AP)—An Iranian student, disconsolate because he had been rejected by an older co-ed, was found dead from hanging yesterday.

Police said Freydon Sanati, 24, son of a wealthy Tehran congressman and exporter, hanged himself with the cord of his red bathrobe. In his apartment police found correspondence identifying the object of Sanati's love as Mrs. Veloe Brink, 32, a war widow of Owensboro, Ky., and until recently a YWCA worker of Visalia, Calif.

"Oh, the poor boy!" Mrs. Brink exclaimed when told of the death. "I felt like a mother to him. I always considered him a little boy."

### Judge Says Judges Err Too Often

GEARHART, Sept. 17 (AP)—A circuit judge told the Oregon State Bar today that judges are making too many mistakes.

Circuit Judge James W. Crawford of Portland said he was "shocked" at the number of lower court trials which, because of error, have been reversed by the state supreme court.

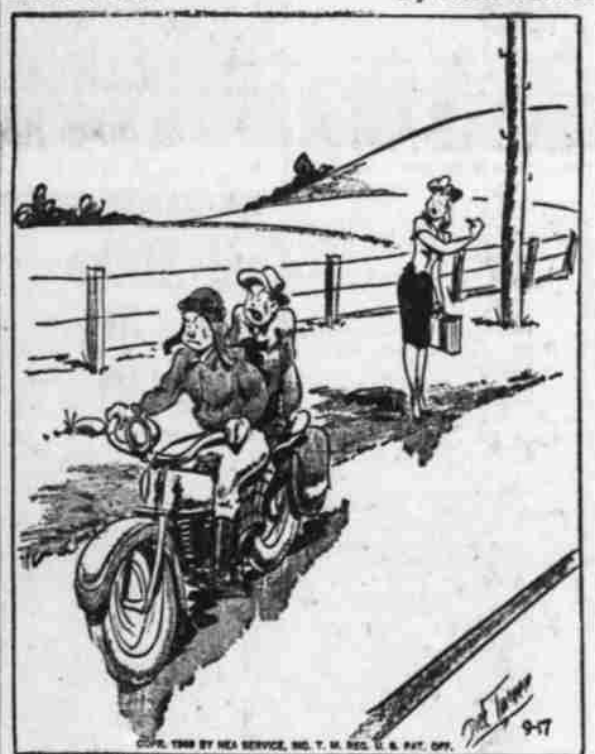
