

Grant Goes To Air For 7-0 Win Over Pelicans

SHAW FIRES TALLY PASS TO BERRIE

The Grant Generals struck suddenly through the air late in the third period last night on Modoc field for a 36-yard touchdown and booted the extra point to carve out a 7 to 0 win over the Klamath Falls Pelicans.

The pass shot from the accurate arm of George Shaw to End Len Berrie who gobbled the ball on the four-yard line and crashed his way over for the score.

Fullback Al Hansen judged the ball over the crossbars for the extra digit with Shaw holding.

Both teams showed opening-game raggedness and the officials were given a workout walking off penalties. Grant was penalized 73 yards, the Pels 52.

Each team tallied touchdowns that were called back on penalties. In the second quarter Joe Demetras kicked over from the seven yard line after a downfield drive set up by a recovered fumble. The play was called back and a five-yard penalty imposed for an offside infraction.

Just before the pay-off pass in the third quarter, Halfback Dale Duff scored for Grant when he slithered around end for a 25-yard gallop but again an official offside penalty nullified the score.

Duff fumbled on the next play but recovered after losing six yards. On the following play Shaw fired the touchdown pass.

In the first half, the Pelicans had the upper hand, holding the Generals to play between the 40 yard lines.

The Generals received the opening kickoff and after driving to the Pelican 40-yard line, were forced to punt. Duff booted into the end zone and the Pels took over on their own 20 and immediately started a determined downfield drive.

The Pels worked up to the Grant 43-yard line, reeling off three first downs with Demetras, Gene Carlson and Gaynor Huck slicing off large chunks of yardage.

Bob McPherson fired a pass, the first for the Pels for the evening, and Shaw intercepted on the 23 and galloped back to the 30.

Tight defensive line work bottled both teams for the remainder of the first quarter.

Midway in the second quarter, Klamath got their first big break of the contest. Duff fumbled on the Grant 33-yard line and Bill Toole and Demetras recovered.

This set the scene for the Pelican score that didn't go in the record books. Carlson reeled off a first down with a 15-yard ramble, cracked through for eight yards, a few plays later and then set up another first down on the seven-yard line.

At this point Demetras took a hand-off and crossed the goal but the play was called back.

The Pelicans threatened again late in the first half. After a punt, the Red-and-White pulled their best offensive play.

With the oval on the 46-yard line, McPherson rifled a short pass to Schuster, who, in turn, lateraled to Carlson coming up from the wing position for a 26-yard gain, putting the ball on Grant's 20-yard line.

But McPherson fumbled two plays later and Grant's Dean Pochert recovered.

An early General threat early in the second half missed fire when a Shaw to Berrie pass missed by inches a first down on the Pelican 17-yard line.

The Grant drive was set up when Hansen latched onto one of McPherson's throws deep in Pelican territory.

The Pelicans drove deep into Grant turf only once in the last half but another fumble stopped a possible score.

The Pelicans threw passes in an attempt to reach paydirt in the last half but only one connected.

Two outstanding weaknesses in the Pelican attack were their passing attacks and lack of interference for ball-carriers on end sweeps. Equative Gaynor Huck, with some protection, would likely have got away on several occasions but he had to go it alone.

An estimated 4500 saw the opening game.

Brooklyn Loses 9-2 To Pirates

Southpaw Werle Hurls Victory; NY, Boston Win

Branch Rickey, baseball's careful cashier, must have had a premonition when he offered Pittsburgh \$200,000 for Willie Werle the first time he laid eyes on the Pirate's freshman southpaw.

Rickey, famed for his shrewd player transactions, once again was made to look good last night when Werle pitched the Pirates to a 9-2 triumph over Brooklyn that dampened the Dodgers' pennant hopes. That was one time the Dodger president didn't enjoy being correct.

The defeat, coupled with St. Louis' triumph over Boston, 7-5, dropped the Brooks two and a half games behind the National league-leading Cardinals.

With only 13 games left to play, 11 of them on the road, the future looks dark for the Dodgers today.

There was no change in the American league race as both New York and Boston won. The front running Yankees maintained their two and a half game edge, beating the Detroit Tigers, 4-1. Fred Hutchinson was the losing pitcher. The runner-up Red Sox kept pace, spanking the St. Louis Browns, 12-4.

The Red Hot Cardinals continued to roll, racking up their sixth straight victory. Warren Spahn, Boston ace, was charged with the loss, the Braves' 13th in their last 14 games. The victory was credited to Max Lanier, who was relieved by Ted Wilk after he was blasted for three runs in the seventh.

Tommy Byrne, who makes a career out of beating the Tigers, tamed his playmates with two hits. The Yankee southpaw now has beaten the Bengals five times this season. Bobby Brown batted in three of the Yanks' four runs with a pair of doubles.

Vern Stephens walloped his 37th and 38th home runs as lefty Mel Parnell pitched his 23rd victory for the Red Sox.

Washington all but eliminated Cleveland from flag contention when they nipped the Indians, 5-4. A base on balls by Bob Feller with the bases loaded in the seventh forced in the winning run.

Chicago's White Sox and Philadelphia's Athletics divided a double-header. The Sox won the second game, 6-3, after Dick Fowler had pitched the A's to a 3-1 triumph in the opener.

Pinch hitters Mickey Owen, Herma Reich and Forrest Burgess came through with base hits to give the Chicago Cubs a 6-4 victory over the New York Giants in 10 innings. Ken Raffensberger won a pitchers' duel from Ken Heintzelman as Cincinnati defeated the Philadelphia Phillies, 2-1.

Ducks Drub Gaels; Bruins Pound OSC

CARPENTER SHACKLED

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 17 (AP)—Rock and sock, and play it close to the vest.

That was the impression today in the wake of a surprising display of offensive strength by the Bruins of UCLA in walloping Oregon State, 35 to 13.

Few of the throng of 37,427, on hand for the opening of the Pacific Coast conference football schedule last night were prepared for the lopsided score.

Certainly the Uclans' new coach from Vanderbilt, Henry R. (Red) Sanders, professed no such anticipation, and the same goes for Oregon State's new mentor, Kip Taylor from Michigan State.

But the issue was never in doubt after Halfback Ernie Johnson took an Oregon State punt and raced it back 61 yards, setting up the first touchdown with the game barely three minutes old.

The toll mounted to 21-0 at half-time, and ended with a 22-point spread—quite different from the 26-0 shelling the Beavers inflicted here last year.

The statistics tell the quickest story—327 yards running to 138. The Bruins tried only six passes, good for 35 yards and one touchdown. Their main punch was on Mother Earth.

Oregon State, noted for its stout lines, couldn't hold the Bruin defense from piling in to bottle up their ace halfback, Ken Carpenter, a gifted triple threat man in any league.

Carpenter, on a jump pass, connected with one for 44 yards and a touchdown by his circus catching receiver, Dick Gray. A reserve back, Gene Morrow, hit Andy Knudsen, on a scoring play good for 56 yards in the final three minutes of the game. But otherwise it was a UCLA celebration.

Co-starring with Johnson, if not overshadowing him, was 177-pound Howie Hansen, whose 64-yard touchdown run off his right end down the sidelines was the most spectacular of the night.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17 (AP)—A dominant Oregon of Oregon scored three touchdowns and a field goal last night to defeat St. Mary's 24-7, in the first night football game in San Francisco's Kezar stadium.
