Stocks Ride Out Storm

NEW YORK, Sept. 19 (AP)—The stock market weathered news of British revaluation in good form today. A fast few minutes of selling immediately after the opening put prices down fractions to a point or more. The balance of the session was devoted to a pretty successful attempt to repair the damage.

Losses were either trimmed or wiped out, and a handful of leading shares wandered into the minus column.

Business was brisker than usual, with turnover at the rate of about 1,300,000 shares for the full session. Gold stocks advanced, as they did on Canadian exchanges and in London.

The wholly unexpected news of devaluation created a favorable impression in Wall Street.

Devaluation, however, as well as the coal walk-out and the touchy stage of steel contract negotiations, inspired a large degree of caution among traders.

Down most of the time, but well above the lows for the day, were Santa Fe, Nickel Plate, Standard Oil (N.J.), United Air Lines, U. S. Steel, General Motors, Chrysler, Schenley, American Telephone, Kennecott Copper and International Paper.

McIntyre Procupine added nearly two points, trailed by Howe Sound, Homestake, and Alaska Juneau.

Leaning ahead were Goodrich, Sears Roebuck, United Aircraft, International Telephone, and John-Manville.

DEVALUATION CUTS GRAINS

CHICAGO, Sept. 19 (AP)—British devaluation of the pound caused selling and considerable nervousness in grain futures today. Prices dropped rather sharply. Wheat was off more than 2 cents at times, corn more than a cent and soybeans 4 cents.

Traders believed the British action might mean fewer U. S. grain exports.

Reported lowering of the government bid for cash wheat at the eastern seaboard also affected grains adversely.

Wheat closed 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents lower than the previous finish. September \$2.08 1/2; corn was down 1/2 to 1 1/2, September \$1.26 1/2-1/2; oats were off 1/2 to 1/2, September 67 1/2; rye was 3 to 4 1/2 cents lower, September \$1.42; soybeans were down 3 1/2 to 4 cents, November \$2.28-2.27 1/2, and hard was 13 to 35 cents a hundred pounds lower, September \$11.97.
