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Ivory Pine Road Section To Be Closed

The Ivory Pine road from highway 66 in to the old Ivory Pine mill and toward Weyerhaeuser camp 6 will be closed for the next week or 10 days while four bridges along the road are being rebuilt.

Wally Hector, county engineer, said traffic in that way will be diverted by other roads to points north of where the bridge work is going on.

Motorists driving in from the direction of Klamath Falls will be directed to turn off two miles east of Beatty at the Beatty cemetery, and go north on a gravelled road 12 miles to the Ivory Pine mill.

The area is closed because of fire danger, but Klamath Agency has granted permission for general travel on that road.

Persons driving in from the east will be directed to turn north two miles east of Bly on what is known as the South Fork road and which comes out north of the bridge work.

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KF Shriners Plan Trip To La Grande

Shriners of Klamath Falls, under the leadership of Rajah Arthur W. Schaupp of Klamath Falls, are making preparations for a trek to La Grande Saturday, October 1, to attend the 1949 Eastern Oregon ceremonial of Al Kader Temple of Portland.

The ceremonial, under the direction of Potentate Earl Riley of Portland, is expected to be one of the largest held in Eastern Oregon. Hundreds of Shriners from all sections of the state will be in attendance to witness the initiation of an estimated 125 candidates.

More than 200 members of Al Kader uniformed bodies will arrive in La Grande the day of the ceremonial from Portland on a special train which will also bring equipment for the colorful and spectacular event.

Rajah Schaupp said today that a

large group of candidates from this area are expected to make up the total of 125 initiates into the mysteries of the eastern rites.

The ceremonial will open with a business meeting at 11 o'clock in the Sacajawea hotel for the election of candidates. A Shrine parade, with floats and entries from participating communities will start at 2:30 and the candidates will be marched to the La Grande high school gym, where the ceremonial will start at 3 o'clock.

She returned to Oregon Thursday night.

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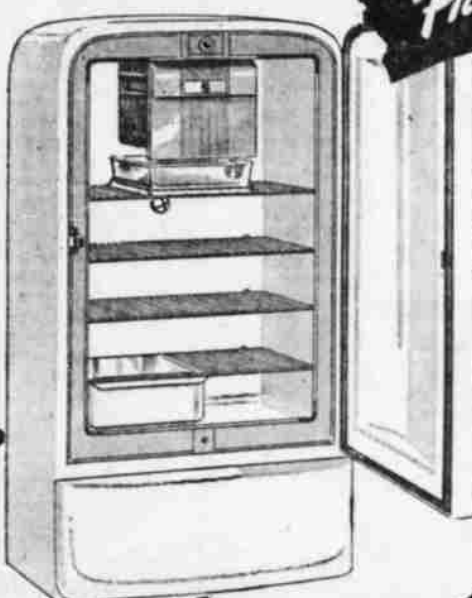
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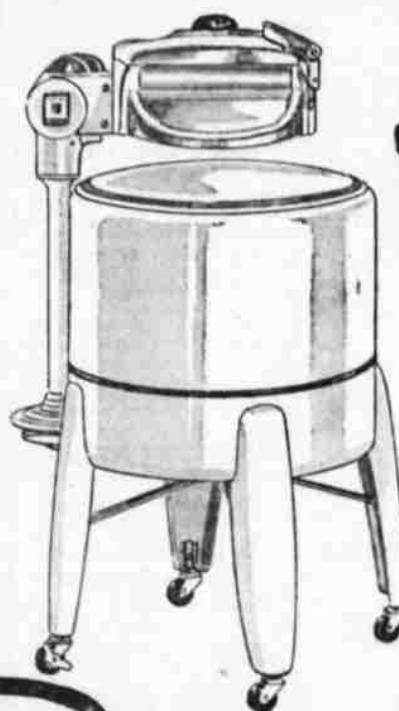
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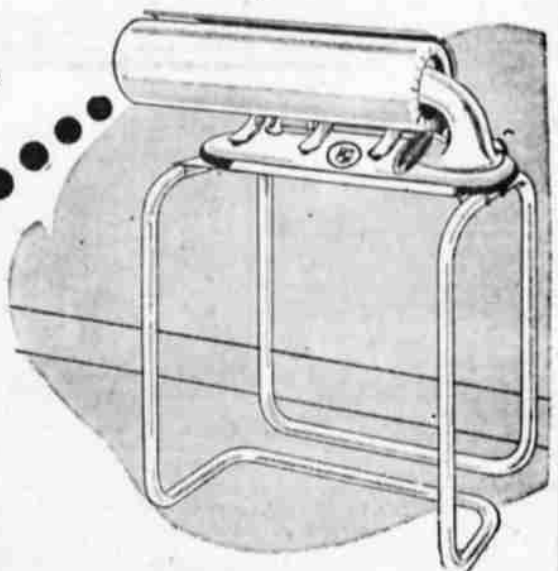
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
