Philadelphia Grabs Eight Gem Baseballers

Red Sox Recall Caselli

The Philadelphia Phillies have recalled or purchased eight members of the 1949 Gems baseball squad and the Boston Red Sox have recalled another, making nine of the 17 players who finished the season with the Gems due for a chance at higher classification baseball next year.

The Phils are still eyeing the remaining players and may pick up one more.

Boys being moved up by purchase are Ted (Pinkie) Hesse, 359-hitting outfielder, Pitcher C. N. Uck Schildmeyer, Infielder Ken Jensen and Catcher Dick Descalso.

All will be taken to the Phils' farm training center at Dyersburg, Tenn., next spring and from there assigned to spots somewhere in the Phils' organization. Hesse is almost certain to play at least class B ball next year.

Recalled by the Phils organization are Johnny Lopeman and Niles Jordan, pitchers, Catcher Ralph Mohler and Shortstop Morris Nordell.

Nordell was sold to Salina, Kan., of the class C Western association and optioned back to the Gems for this season. He may be moved up another notch to play class B ball.

The Boston Red Sox have recalled Outfielder Bob Caselli for their San Jose affiliate in the class C California league.

With those nine players leaving, the Gems have a very small core to count on when the 1950 season rolls around.

Among them are Mike Fernandez, Jack Buick, Elyven Eason and Clyde DeWitt, the latter a semi-pro pitcher signed at the close of the season.

Gordon Hernandez probably will move up as an infielder. Butch Falter possibly is through with baseball and the same goes for the veteran Bill Reese.

Jayvees Crush Trojans

A big, experienced Klamath Union Jayvee squad rolled to a 43-0 victory in the expense of Sacred Heart Academy on Modoc practice field Saturday afternoon.

In registering their seven-touchdown total the baby Pelicans scored at least once in all four periods, and kicked one conversion.

Left half Al Davis started the parade in the first minute of the contest, plunging over from the T to gain two yard stripe.

Toward the end of the first canto fullback Al Herrera of the Red and Whites pulled a one-man stunt by clocking a Trojan punt and then going over from the fifteen two plays later.

Single tallies were registered in each of the second and third periods. Half back Roger Bliss plunged over from the Academy two-yard line on a hand off from quarter-back Dimick, making the half time total 19-0 for the red-shirted Jayvees.

Burly Al Herrera came back in the second half to pick up his second scoring effort for the day by cracking over center on a two yard plunge.

Idaho Vandals, WSC Cougars Pour Power On Bearcats, Aggies

Storm flags were flying in the Palouse hills today where a couple of touchdown tornadoes appeared to be brewing.

In their 1949 football baptisms, the Idaho Vandals ran wild Saturday to crush the Willamette Bearcats, 79-0 at Moscow and the Washington State Cougars showed power-a-plenty at Pullman with their 33-0 romp over the Utah State Aggies.

It was a different story at Seattle, where the University of Washington's Hank Tiedemann raced 80 yards on a punt return in the last two minutes to give the Huskies a 14-7 victory over the Utah Redskins.

Coach Dixie Howell's Vandals, turning up in a King's-X game against the Bearcats of the northwest conference, broke loose for 41 points in the fourth quarter to run up the nation's most lopsided score.

Two of the Idaho touchdowns were made by Center Ken Larsen on run-backs of pass interceptions. The Vandals chalked up 585 yards and 23 first downs to Willamette's 85 and four.

Quarterback Bob Gambold sparked the Cougars' potent aerial attack that accounted for three touchdowns and set up a fourth. Bud Roffler grabbed one of Gambold's tosses and raced 53 yards to paydirt in the longest run of the game.

Among the Northwest's smaller colleges, the Portland Pilots looked impressive in their home field 32-0 triumph over Central Washington of the Evergreen conference. John Freeman's 71-yard run capped a three touchdown Portland attack in the second quarter.

Pacific university of the Northwest loop and Pacific Lutheran of the Evergreen circuit battled to a 20-20 tie at Forest Grove, Ore., as the Lutes came back with 13 points in the final quarter. Passes by John Jurkovich and Gene Standess connected for the two late Lute TD's.

Halfback Carl Wickham scored four touchdowns as Linfield college trounced Eastern Oregon College of Education 49-0 at La Grande, Ore. Jim Heins kicked all seven conversions.

Lewis & Clark dumped Western Washington College of Education 19-0 at Bellingham. Bob Pollard was the big gun of the Oregon attack, passing to one touchdown and setting up another.

St. Martin's scored once in the first period and twice in the fourth while whipping University of British Columbia 21-0 at Olympia. The B. C. Thunderbirds never threatened. A 72-yard march resulted in the first period tally with a John Donahue to Ted Reppas pass as the pay-off play.

Warriors Rout Owls 33 To 0

FORT LEWIS, Sept. 17 (Special) A powerful Fort Lewis football team went berserk in the first half this afternoon, scoring five touchdowns and adding three extra points, to pound out a 33 to 0 win over the Oregon Tech Owls from Klamath Falls. Seven thousand fans saw the game.

The Owls came to life in the second half, battering downfield for several scoring chances, but were snipped by a stalwart Warrior forward wall.

The game was not five minutes old when Ernest Parker, elusive Warrior halfback, scooted 32 yards for the first Fort score. This stab came after Manford Gregg and Herbert Horton moved the ball down from the Tech 38 to the Division 32 leading a concerted drive.

The Oregon team came to life at this point and moved down to the Washington 14 yard line after a driving 52 yard plurge but Chuck Warren fumbled a lateral from Quarterback Otis Elder and the march ended there.

The Warriors ignited another march for 85 yards and a touchdown capped by Mark Kato's touchdown pitch to Edgar Shelter.

In the second quarter, the Warriors added three more six-pointers and tacked on extra points. The first score was from a 13-yard pass. Dick Richardson hurled and End Bob Treogor catching; Treogor intercepted Elder's pass and raced 44 yards for the fourth score; Norm Crawford chased in on a 69-yard sustaining drive with an off-tackle eight yard touchdown smash.

In the second half, the Techers were a rejuvenated machine but were repelled just short of the final line twice.

Warren, Elder, Dean Weekly and Ken Miller alternated in carrying the mail and moved from their own 20 to the enemy 13 but there they met a stubborn defense and fell short of scoring.

The Owls bobbed up with an aerial game in the closing minutes of the game in an attempt to draw blood. They completed three of four consecutive throws and moved within the Warrior goal line. But a last-down desperation pitch was intercepted.

End John Paasch averaged 25 yards per punt for Oregon Tech. The Owls were handicapped by ragged blocking.

Bill Gives Federal Aid To Fisheries

On Saturday, August 27, the Dineen bill passed the senate, with a few minor and strengthening amendments, thus ending a 10-year fight to secure a federal aid program for state fishery restoration projects, reports the national wildlife federation. The bill earmarks the existing excise tax on fishing rods, reels, creels and artificial lures, baits and flies to provide the necessary revenues to carry out the federal and state programs. Seventy-five per cent of the cost of a project is paid from this earmarked fund; the balance of 25 per cent is paid from the state fishing license fund.

Page Saves Yanks Again NY Holds AL Lead In Cleveland Win

The outstanding feature of the New York Yankee pennant drive, aside from Joe Page's sterling relief exploits, is the uncanny way that Manager Casey Stengel's substitutes have come through for the injured front-liners.

Although plagued with over 60 injuries, the Yanks have paced the American league since opening day.

The Yankee man of the hour is Hank Bauer, speedy strong-armed outfielder.

Joe DiMaggio, who missed the first 65 games of the season, reported at game time yesterday with a high fever. The clipper, once regularly hitting over 300, was scratched from the lineup and Bauer installed.

Bauer drove in three runs with a double and triple to lead the Yanks to a 7-3 victory over the Cleveland Indians. The triumph preserved the Yanks' two and one-half game lead over the Boston Red Sox, who mauled the Chicago White Sox, 11-5, in the first two innings.

Yankees' second baseman, Phil Rizzuto, was the victim of one of the wildest first innings in the memory of Yankee stadium patrons.

With one out, Lou Boudreau singled and scored on a double by Mickey Vernon. Vernon galloped to third on a wild pitch and scored when Rasmussen committed a balk. Larry Doby walked and stole second.

Yankee pitcher, Ralph Kiner, threw a wild pitch to center field and the umpire allowed Doby to go to third, ruling that second sacker Gerry Coleman had obstructed Doby by sitting on him. Doby promptly stole home on Rasmussen's first pitch to Bob Kennedy for Cleveland's third and last run of the game.

Ralph Buxton, Hugh Casey and Page followed 19-game winner Rasmussen. Casey gained credit for his first American league triumph but Page, Casey's 1947 world series foe, was needed to save the game.

The Red Sox met no resistance from Chicago. The Boston wrecking crew, led by Ted Williams, rained nine runs across the plate in the first two innings.

Williams blasted two homers, his 39th and 40th of the season, and drove home six runs to boost his pace-setting run-batted-in total to 153. Vern Stephens chipped in with his 39th four-bagger.

Solid hitting also parked the National league's front-running St. Louis Cardinals to a 15-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies. Home runs by Ron Northey, Stan Musial and Enos Slaughter featured an 18-hit onslaught.

The massacre of the Phils protected the Cards' two and one-half game edge over the Brooklyn Dodgers. The Dodgers tamed the Chicago Cubs, 7-1, but it was a squeaker until the eighth when the Dodgers tallied four runs.

The Pittsburgh Pirates and the New York Giants divided a doubleheader, the Giants taking the opener, 13-4, and the Pirates the nightcap, 7-4. Ralph Kiner of the Pirates failed to hit in either game.

The Cincinnati Reds edged the Boston Braves, 7-6 in the first game of a bargain bill. The second was called after nine innings because of darkness with the score deadlocked at 1-1.

Philadelphia and Detroit swept both games in the only American league twin bill. The A's dumped the St. Louis Browns, 7-5 and 7-1, and the Tigers brushed by Washington 7-2 and 5-1.
