Only High Rankers To Be Taken By Teachers' Schools

EUGENE, Sept. 20—Only high school students in the higher brackets will be admitted to the teacher education programs at Oregon's three colleges of education this fall. Those in the lower 50 per cent of their high school graduation classes will not be permitted to enroll.

This step toward elevating the standards of the teaching profession was approved October 26, 1948, by the state board of higher education. Dr. Henry M. Gunn, president of Oregon College of Education and director of elementary teacher education for the system, proposed the move after it had been tried experimentally at the Monmouth college.

As approved, the policy will affect only those students at Eastern and Southern Oregon Colleges of Education who enter the teacher education program. In addition to liberal arts and sciences, various semi-professional curricula are offered at the LaGrande and Ashland schools.

Freshmen are to report to the campuses Thursday, September 22.

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3 Elephant Circus Stars Coming Here

In a year's time, the "three girls from Hollywood" have put on considerable weight. They've gained something like half a ton apiece.

They are Frank Whitbeck's MGM elephants, with the Shrine-Polack Brothers circus, which the Klamath Falls Shrine club will present twice daily Thursday, Friday and Saturday, September 22, 23 and 24, at the Klamath armory.

They were mere two-year-olds when Metro-Goldwyn Mayer imported them from Spain in 1939. Queenie then was four feet three inches high, Happy four one and Sally three ten. They weighed scarcely 1500 pounds each. Now look at them! Queenie is still the biggest and Sally has passed up Happy, but even Happy has to duck to get through an eight-foot doorway. And they have several years yet to grow before they reach maturity.

Tarzan Vets
 The wildest jungle life they have known was in the Tarzan pictures. They also appeared in various other films before the studio gave them a leave of absence to join the circus. Van Johnson is one of their closest friends.

Their repertoire embraces 27 distinct tricks. Among them are such individual specialties as Sally's "bumps," Happy's barrel role and Queenie's hula dance.

James (Slivers) Madison, their trainer, considers them the best disciplined elephants he has handled in the 25 years since he ran away from home to become a circus trapper. If they could put it in words, they would probably return the compliment by lauding the so-

licious care he and his assistant, Frenchie Durant, give them.

Verbal commands have supplanted sharp prods from a vicious instrument known as a "bull hook." Madison and his petite wife, Jo, present the "girls" with a savvy and sartorial smartness that has caused them to be known as the "society elephants of the circus world."
