Forest Staff Change Gives Bates Boost

For the present, Forester M. L. Tedrow will be assigned timber carried by Forester Bates in addition to his present responsibilities except fire control activities which are being added to the division of engineering headed by Forest Engineer Loyd Bransford.

Tedrow has been a member of the Rogue river forest since 1934 except during the years 1936 to 1939 when he served on the Colville national forest with headquarters at Republic, Wash.

Bransford was transferred to the Rogue river national forest from Alaska in April 1946 and has since served on the forest supervisor's staff.

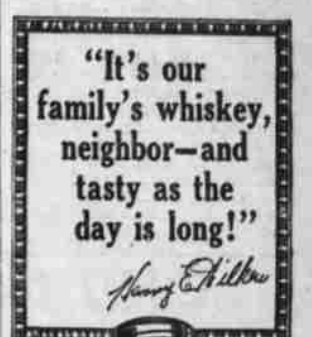
