

Vet Seriously Injured; Car Crashes Truck

A recently discharged soldier was seriously injured in an automobile accident four miles south of Madras, Tuesday afternoon.

Hurt was 17-year-old Amos C. Perkins, boy 75, Veneta, Ore., who was en route home following his discharge. His condition is considered serious at Klamath Valley hospital.

Perkins was traveling north on highway 97 when it crashed into the rear of a truck. His car was nearly demolished.

Hunters Get Stiff Fines In California

State and federal game officers cracked down on California game violators with the September 16 opening of deer season.

Baldwin, arrested September 19, pleaded guilty before Justice of the Peace Katie Doolittle for possession of a fawn and quail. Parts of three other illegal deer were found in his possession.

On September 20, officers searched the ranch home of Tom Karas, Davis Creek, and found parts of four fawn deer and sage hens. He pleaded guilty and Judge Doolittle socked him with a \$500 fine.

Lions Plan Students' Eye Survey

Siskiyou Hospital District Hearing Slated Next Week

YREKA, Sept. 21 — Wednesday, September 28, has been set as the date of a public hearing of the countywide hospital district proposal by the Siskiyou county board of supervisors.

The date of the session may be changed, however, if Supervisor W. T. Davidson is unable to get back from the Los Angeles county fair in time. The place and hour in either instance will be the courthouse at 10 a. m.

While in session Monday, the supervisors also accepted the resignation of Clifford E. Butler, justice of the peace of Yreka Township and a appointed Attorney W. B. Seymour as his successor. The change to be effective October 15. Butler gave too heavy a workload in his office as his reason for quitting.

Approved a claim of the Klamath River Sportsmen for \$305 for a warehouse at Dorris to store feed for game birds.

Rejected a motion by Supervisor W. A. Barr to redistrict the county under the Yreka chamber of commerce plan by failing to second it. Set the pay scale for election workers November 8 at \$7.50 for wards under 100, \$10 for 100 to 300, \$12.50 for 300 to 600 and \$15 for more than 500 registered voters.

Fires Cover N. California

WILLITS, Calif., Sept. 21 — Brush and lumber fires, including one which for a time threatened homes on the edge of Ukiah, were burning over a wide area of Northern California today.

Charles Campbell, state forestry division ranger at Howard park district headquarters, said continued high temperatures and low humidity expected today and tomorrow offered no prospect of early relief.

A brush fire in the hills overlooking Ukiah was reported under control last night after blackening an estimated 1000 acres.

The blaze for a time threatened some homes on the city's outskirts, but no damage was reported.

Bus Damage Suit Starts Tomorrow

The first of two \$25,000 damage suits growing out of a bus-crash near Keno almost three years ago will go on trial tomorrow morning in justice court.

The suit was brought by Sadie C. Hopper, 45, against Pacific Greyhound and the driver of the bus, Alton Harry Demmel. The second, scheduled for trial next Monday, was placed against the company by Grace Velde Gibson, 41.

Both women were injured November 26, 1946, when their car and a Medford-bound bus collided on a road near Keno. Mrs. Hopper was driving the car. Both complainants charge Demmel was operating the bus on the wrong side of the highway at the time of the crash. The women spent about 17 days in Klamath Valley hospital after the accident.

Forest Men Laid Off

Forest service lookouts and firemen have been laid off in the Klamath area, and whether the lay-off becomes permanent for this season depends on how serious the fire danger is the rest of this year.

The lay-off affects only "short-term" employees in the Klamath district of the Rogue River national forest.

Klamath Forest Protective association summer crews and Fremont crews are still on the job. If the fire danger does not increase in the next few weeks, Klamath district men will not be put back into service.

KFPA crews will not be called off the job until the end of the fire season in mid-October.

Klamath Woman Hurt In Wreck

An accident on the Sexton mountain summit near Grants Pass on September 15, seriously injured Ida Lillian Wu, wife of Goon Pan Wu of Bonanza.

The Klamath woman, returned here by ambulance Sunday, was pinned under the car for 45 minutes. Her son, William Gay Wu, 18, and Goon were not badly hurt. Mrs. Wu was in Josephine General hospital in Grants Pass for a time.

It is the same point where two Grants Pass football team members were killed last fall when the bus carrying the athletes failed to make the turn. Several other serious accidents have occurred at this curve.

AWOL Corporal Jailed Here

Cleo Parks, 26-year-old airforce corporal, is held in the county jail today for delivery to army authorities as absent without leave.

He was taken into custody yesterday near Sprague River after he thumbed a ride with a state patrolman. Parks' home is in Sprague River, and he has been stationed at an air base near Merced, Calif.

He reportedly told the police officer he left camp about September 1 because his commanding officer refused to transfer him overseas, and was on his way to Klamath Falls to surrender to the army recruiting officer when picked up.

Twelve-year-old Fay Marshall, 1915 Oregon, was taken to Klamath Valley hospital for treatment of a knee injury received when she stumbled off a six-inch high sidewalk early last night.

Six Charged On Robeson Riot Counts

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Sept. 21 (AP)—A police chief's son and five other young men were under indictments today in connection with violence which followed a Paul Robeson concert September 4.

They allegedly were among road-blockers who stoned the concert crowd leaving the left-wing Negro singer's performance. Three of them are teen-agers.

One of those named is Joseph A. Lillis Jr., 25, son of the police chief at Peekskill, N. Y., near where the outdoor concert was held.

In the indictments handed down yesterday by a county grand jury, Lillis was charged with hurling a stone through a car window.

Four others, charged with overturning a parked car, were accused of felonious, malicious mischief.

More than 100 persons were injured in the barrage of stones and sticks that met departing concert-goers, following an anti-communist veterans parade outside the concert grounds. A half dozen cars were overturned.

2 Men, Girls Held After Arrest Here

Two youthful ex-convicts arrested here on charges involving two Kelloge, Ida, teen-age girls, this morning were ordered held for grand jury action, but Sheriff Jack Franey said the two may be sent back to Idaho for prosecution.

They are Roy Morris, 31, and Gene Arthur Miller, 22, both charged here with contributing to the delinquency of the 17-year-old Kelloge girls who accompanied them to Klamath Falls.

A preliminary hearing on the charges was held yesterday afternoon in justice court.

Sheriff Franey said the men were wanted in Corvallis for passing bad checks and that he had received information they may be implicated in a \$2000 robbery at Kellogg.

The girls are held in juvenile custody here.

Morris and Miller were arrested last Sunday morning after stealing a car here and attempting to steal license plates from another vehicle.

Tire, Tubes Held For Owner

A new 600x16 four-ply tire and two tubes, the latter still in cartons, are being held by state police for the owner.

The tire and tubes were found on Summers lane and turned over to state officers. Sgt. E. W. Tichenor said the owner may identify and claim the articles at the state police barracks.

Lake County Survey Points To Importance Of Timber

LAKEVIEW, Sept. 21 — The result of recent surveys and studies made by the Lake County chamber of commerce industrial committee was presented the regular chamber forum luncheon September 19, first of the fall meetings after the summer's recess.

Committee Chairman Ray Harlan gave a brief outline of the problems faced by the committee in its efforts to find a method of maintaining payroll for Lakeview in spite of the declining timber supply.

Committee recommendations call for a request by the Lake County chamber of commerce for a hearing on the federal timber unit in the near future. The establishment of such a unit would, it was believed, have considerable effect upon stabilizing the economy of Lakeview. Without the assurance of a continued timber supply, the committee found that it was difficult to sell outside interests on the idea of establishing remanufacturing units.

The Lakeview federal timber unit would tend to alleviate this problem.

The five man hour remanufacturing requirement for timber within the unit (after primary milling) as suggested in the proposed policy statement was agreed upon by the committee as an effective means of stimulating remanufacture for Lakeview.

Merle Lowden, Fremont national forest supervisor outlined for the group the extent of national forest lands within the present Lakeview working circle which would be affected by the timber unit plan. He pointed out that difference between the new forest service management plan on a sustained yield basis, now effective, and the federal unit. Essentially the management plan deals with cutting methods on a sustained yield basis, whereas the federal unit prescribes a definite area within which timber would receive a certain degree of remanufacture.

At the Monday forum the chamber voted in favor of adopting the committee report and urged by a majority vote the chamber's re-
