U.S. Charges Monopoly To Publisher

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—The government today filed a civil action charging the Lorain (Ohio) Journal company and four of its officers with conspiracy to monopolize the spread of news, advertising and other information.

Attorney General McGrath announced the suit was filed in federal district court at Cleveland. He said it is the first case in which a newspaper has been charged with conspiring to injure a competing radio station.

A justice department statement said the company and its officers are charged with acquiring ownership of their competitors and refusing to publish in the Journal advertisements of business houses who advertise over radio stations in Lorain and Elyria, Ohio, or who

advertise in the Lorain Sunday News, a newspaper published every Sunday.

They are accused also, the department said, of inducing publishers of the Elyria Chronicle-Telegram not to circulate their newspaper in Lorain.

The two cities are adjacent.

Movie To Tell Nile's Story

KHARTOUM, Anglo-Egyptian Sudan (AP)—A former University of California instructor single-handedly is making a color motion picture of the Nile, mightiest river in the world. For J. Michael Hagopian, of Hollywood Academy Films, Ltd., it isn't a new assignment. Before coming to Africa he made a movie of the Mississippi. His next assignment is the Ganges, in India.

The educational documentary will show every aspect of the Nile's 4000-mile length, from Lake Victoria to the Mediterranean Delta. Hagopian will use anything that can move and carry him during his work, including chartered airplanes, bicycles and river steamers.

Defense Attorney Clarence J. Young of Portland this morning moved to have the two trials consolidated but J. C. O'Neill and U. S. Balentine, representing Mrs. Hopper and Mrs. Gibson, declined to consolidate.

At noon today only nine prospective members of the trial jury had been examined.

Fifteen miles of the Chiloquin-Sprague River Klamath county road bobbed up in the list of 24 projects to be constructed under the federal aid program of 1950-51 when the state highway commissioners offered a list of federal-aid projects in Portland yesterday.

The stretch of road, calling for resurfacing and oiling, would cost in the neighborhood of \$150,000.

The commission mapped out \$2,000,000 worth of work in all, the bulk being secondary highway projects.
